so bogged up the street that work cannot commence."

The hot water heats the K. D. building and heated the White Pelican hotel before that structure burned down.

Petition to improve Martin street from Main street to Orchard avenue, three blocks, by the laying of water bound macadam, was submitted to the council last night and tentatively approved.

The petition was referred to the city engineer who will make a preliminary survey and submit an estimate for the project as soon as

preliminary expense money is submitted.

Plans and specifications for Unit 22, an alley north of the Klamath county high school, and for unit 68—south Sixth street—were approved and City Attorney A. W. Schaupp ordered to draw up a resolution of intention.

Residents Reassured.
Concern of California avenue residents that California avenue would be paved before water mains were laid by the California Oregon Power company, was somewhat dispelled last night by City Engineer Don Zumwalt and C. A. Dunn, contractor for the project. The protesters, who spoke through City Attorney Schaupp, felt that it would be necessary to tear up the pavement after it was laid.

"As I understand the power company's intentions," Mr. Dunn explained, "a section of water main will be laid across intersections, the only place where it would have been necessary to tear up the pavement. This will be merely dead-end pipe, which when the time comes to lay the water main, will constitute a part of the main. Necessity of tearing up the pavement would thus be obviated."

Postponed Temporarily.
It was brought out that the California Oregon Power company had constructed four blocks of the water main from Conger avenue north, but had decided to postpone the remainder of the project until next year.

The matter was referred to City Engineer Don J. Zumwalt for investigation.

Permits to blast were granted to G. C. Totman, who desires to excavate for a basement in first addition, and Dunn and Baker, for moving rock on the Mt. Whitney street project.

Petition of Roy Call to install a gasoline pump and tank at his warehouse in Second Railroad addition was referred to the fire committee with power to act.

Rice Is Upheld.
The administration upheld A. L. Rice, city building inspector, in the first problem that has confronted the city since the passage of the building code.

According to Rice, the contractor for the Christie hotel on Tenth and Main streets, insisted on using wood lath.

"That is against the code, and the contractor claims that inasmuch as he secured the permit for the building before the code was approved, he is not liable for its provisions," Mr. Rice informed the council.

"Personally I recommend that he be forced to comply with the provisions of the code."

Motion Approved.
Councilman Olds' motion to sustain the judgment of the inspector was unanimously ratified.

Rice was also upheld in his contention that a barn should not be erected in the California avenue district.

Bill for over 500 meals, aggregating \$203.25, will be submitted to the county court by the city. The meals were served county prisoners incarcerated in the city jail as an accommodation to county authorities.

Assessed valuations of three paving projects—Mt. Whitney street, Orchard avenue and California avenue—were reported by Police Judge Lem L. Gahagan to be large enough to carry the improvement. A shadow of doubt was cast over the Cypress and Rogers street improvement, but the city council did not entertain much doubt of the project.

BUILDING HERE SHOWS \$119,740 FOR TWO WEEKS

Single Permit for 100,000 Keeps Average for City Up to High Point

With the single exception of the proposed \$100,000 moving picture theatre, building in Klamath Falls during the past two weeks has suffered a slackening up, it was revealed last night at a council meeting when 17 building applications aggregating a total investment of \$119,740 were granted at the recommendation of City Building Inspector A. L. Rice.

Permit for the new theatre was granted to H. R. Perrin, architect. The structure will arise across the street from the White Pelican hotel site.

Houston, alteration of dwelling on Ninth street; repairing dwelling in Hillside addition, Hyrd Tompkins, to cost \$250; Carl Landell and Hans Christensen, addition to a dwelling in Nichols addition to cost \$190; Charles S. Waldup, a garage in Mills second addition, to cost \$75; J. R. Herschberger, a garage in Nichols addition to cost \$500; Mrs. Grace Stringham, a garage in Buena Vista addition to cost \$75; G. C.
