Special Coach Will Transport Club Members

been tentatively retained. The defense had not, at the noon recess, exerted any of its 12 peremptory challenges nor had the district attorney's office used one of its limit of six.

Eight Retained

Jurors who have been tentatively retained and who are subject to state and prosecution peremptories include E. B. Henry, Charles Mack, Walter E. Folsom, O. D. Mathews, Jacob Rueck, Roland Kelly, W. H. Pankey, and W. L. Frain.

Many of the jurors, excused for cause professed to have formed an opinion of the case, and several admitted that they did not believe in capital punishment.

W. P. Myers is Clark's attorney. District Attorney W. M. Duncan and assistant District Attorney U. S. Ballelyne are bearing the brunt of the prosecution.

Mrs. Clark was shot and killed as she was on her way home from the Presbyterian church where she had just attended a musical recital. The fatal shot was fired at the corner of Tenth and High, adjacent to the home of O. M. Hector.

Mrs. Clark after having sustained the wound, rushed across the street into the home of Nate Otterbein where she collapsed. She died several days later.

Clark was arrested by police, lodged in the city jail and later indicted on the charge of first degree murder.

Although July sixth is the anniversary of the date that the fifteen pioneers whose names will appear on the marker, crossed the river at the point to be marked, it was judged more fitting to hold the celebration on a day when it can be more largely attended by residents throughout the county.

The chapter extends through the press, a most cordial invitation to the general public and especially to all the descendants of the men being honored. A feature of the program will be a roll call of the fifteen names, to be answered by the descendants of each pioneer who may be present. These will be introduced to the audience as honored guests.
