



TITLE BOUT TO BE STAGED SOON

Winner of Grimes-Shea Go Will Claim Featherweight Championship

LOS ANGELES, June 8. (UP).—California's first title bout of the 1927 boxing season will be held here June 13 when Billy Grimes of Australia and Eddie Shea of Cleveland meet in a ten round go.

The victor will lay claim to the featherweight championship, vacant since Louis "Kid" Kaplan was unable to scale the 126-pound maximum weight.

Grimes in his first American start some weeks ago, dropped the decision to "Doc" Snell of Tacoma, junior lightweight, at the end of a rippling ten.

Four times in the first three rounds the Australian was crashing to the canvas, only to come back from the fifth round on with an array of punches that pummeled Snell's face almost beyond recognition.

In Shea, Grimes is pitted against a featherweight who holds victories over Oakland Johnny Farr, Pete Sammartino, and other topping featherweights.

Both battlers have posted forfeits to weigh in at 2 p. m. on the day of the fight at not more than 126 pounds.

YANKEES KNOCK OUT 4 HOMERS

Pittsburgh and New York Retain Positions as Leaders of League

(By the Associated Press) Battle flags of the Pittsburgh Pirates and New York Yankees still are flying at the top of the major leagues despite the efforts of 11 other clubs to lower them.

All the home run power in the bats of Ruth and Gehrig was needed by the Yankees yesterday to repulse the charging White Sox, but the league leaders managed to turn back their rivals by a count of 4-1.

Ruth made his 18th homer, Gehrig his 14th and Pat Collins added another, while Clancy of the White Sox cracked out one for the visitors only tally.

Opening their series against the Giants, the national league leaders were as successful as the Yankees. The Pirates got 18 hits off the notoriously poor New York pitching and won, 9 to 6.

Chicago's 7 to 6 victory over Brooklyn meanwhile sent the Cubs to third place above the Giants and only a few points below the Cardinals.

Jakie May's seven-hit pitching gave the Cincinnati Reds a 5 to 1 start on their series with the Phillies, while the Red Sox just survived a Tiger rally in the ninth and held the long end of a 6-5 count.

Connie Mack's revised lineup won a hitting match from the Browns, 11 to 9.

The Boston Braves' 12 to 5 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals was remarkable chiefly for the lack of consideration with which the visitors treated the champions' touted pitching staff, while the Senators' 10-3 decision over the Cleveland Indians was partly due to the hitting of Tris Speaker against his old teammates.

They arrived in a downpour, but left in brilliant sunshine, giving the waiting platoon of photographers their innings. The ambassador was slightly annoyed at the cameras' persistence and finally shouted an energetic "Let's go boys," or its equivalent in German, and the car whirled the trio back to the embassy.

The major dome of the presidential household in full uniform, with ivory-headed cane and cocked hat under his arm, said farewell from the top of the steps. The ambassador today broke out a new American flag in honor of its guests—a banner of such ample proportions as to dominate the entire Wilhelmplatz.

U. S. Flag Shows. The Stars and Stripes were displayed all about the business section of Berlin, often in clusters with the German national colors and the Prussian state flag. Seldom has such decoration been seen for an occasion other than a national fête day.

Crowds remained in front of the embassy, braving occasional severe showers to get a look at the visitors, every appearance of whom evoked shouts which could be heard blocks away.

Chamberlain is anxious to go to Moscow to study state of commercial aviation of Russia, but told inquiries: "The only official invitation we have received was that of the Austrian government. We would like very much to go to Vienna, but are not sure yet whether we can accept. We are in the hands of Ambassador Schurman."

SECOND SPECIAL VENIRE ISSUED

Murder Trial of Frank Clark Proceeds Slowly in Circuit Court Today

With 11 prospective jurors in the box, the murder trial of Frank Clark was adjourned for the second time shortly before noon today following the issuance of a special venire for 15 more jurors by Circuit Judge A. L. Leavitt.

At the time of the adjournment, the state had exercised one of its peremptory challenges and the defense five. Jurors in the box are as follows: Charles Mack, Walter Folsom, Jacob Rueck, Roland Kelly, W. H. Pankay, W. L. Frain, H. L.

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Jones, Lee Corbell, Ernest Bennett, Henry Anderson and Julius Oss. Clark is charged with the murder of his former wife, Mrs. Nellie F. Clark, on Sunday night, April 3, at the corner of Tenth and Lincoln streets. At the time she was on her way home from the Presbyterian church, where, with a companion, she had been attending a musical recital.

Opening statements will probably not be made until tomorrow morning. It is hoped by both state and defense to complete selection of the jury by this afternoon.

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DENTIST SUED BY MRS. MAHAN

Practitioner Charged With Being the Cause of Man's Death

Charging that the death of her husband, Fred D. Mahan, was caused through the negligence of Dr. O. J. Johnson, Klamath Falls dentist, Mrs. Alice P. Mahan, administratrix of the Mahan estate, brought suit this morning on behalf of the estate against Dr. Johnson for the recovery of \$7500.

Mrs. Mahan charges in her complaint that Dr. Johnson, while her deceased husband was having teeth extracted, through carelessness, allowed a piece of tooth to slip down

the complaint concludes: "That the said deceased had a life expectancy of more than 17 years and by reason of the untimely death of the deceased, caused by the negligence and carelessness . . . of the defendant as hereinbefore described. The estate of the deceased, Fred D. Mahan, has been damaged in the sum of \$7500."
