man was planning to drill a wildcat well near Klamath Falls I decided to look over the possibilities for bringing in a new field," said Mr. Robinson. "While I am not a geologist, I have been engaged in the petroleum industry for the past

twenty years and have a little more than a smattering idea of a good location. His structure is well defined and at least four known producing oil sands will be tapped in the drilling to a depth of 3 thousand feet. Whether or not these sands carry oil in this district can only be determined by drilling, but the fact that more than one known producing sand is within reach of the drill is an important factor."

Mr. Robinson left by automobile today for Portland and plans to return to Klamath Falls the latter part of next week.

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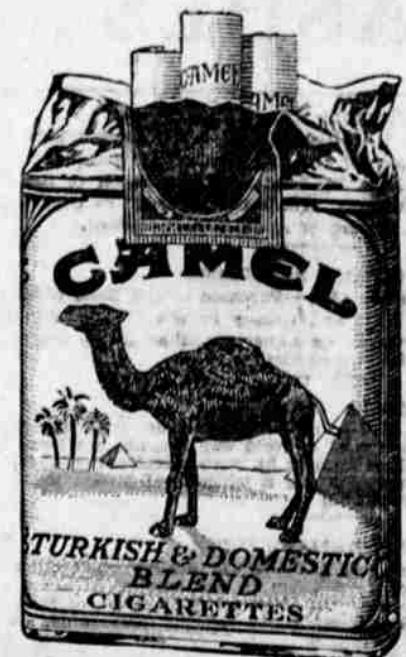
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
