RAIL SITUATION STILL IN DOUBT

Negotiations in Progress Between Heads of Competing Lines

NEW YORK, June 10. (United Press)—No decision has yet been reached on a joint trackage agreement and on other matters involving the Central Oregon railroad situation, by President William Spruille of the Southern Pacific railroad company and President Ralph Budd of the Great Northern railroad, it was announced today.

"The situation," the United Press was told today at the executive offices of the Southern Pacific, "remains unchanged."

"However," the S. P. spokesman qualified, "negotiations between the two rail heads are still in progress."

Use in the above dispatch of the expression "joint trackage and other matters" is taken here to mean that the proposed transfer of terminal properties between the S. P. and the Northern lines is also being discussed by the two rail presidents.

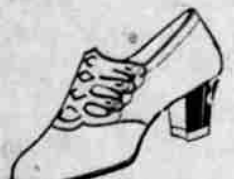

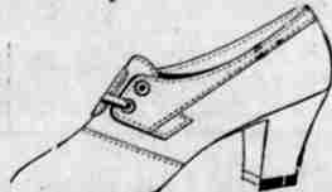
