PARENTS OF KLAMATH FALLS BABY SOUGHT

FLYER HERO GETS GREAT RECEPTION

Youth Takes Blast Gotham by Storm; Thousands Cheer

NEW YORK, June 13, (AP)—Considering him one of their own because he left from here on his pioneering flight to France, New York's millions today welcomed Charles A. Lindbergh, viking of the Atlantic heavens, as they had never welcomed any one before. After a greeting from 30,000 throngs at the battery that shook the city and a triumphal march up Broadway through close packed acclaiming crowds and a paper snow-storm from the windows of the craziest sky scrapers, the young flyer arrived at City Hall at 2:00 p. m. this afternoon.

When the shrieking of harbor whistles gave notice that Lindbergh had landed from the bay, to which he flew from Mitchell Field at Washington, a great rolling roar of welcome spread through the city. Over miles and miles of the financial, wholesale, shopping and residential sections paper drifted into the air in the city's traditional welcome to its heroes.
