



Fugate and Starkey Will Meet Tomorrow Night in Main Event Of Fast Chiloquin Fight Card

In what gives every promise of being another one of those sensational fight cards—like the first card staged by the Chiloquin boxing commission—Johnny Fugate and "Kid" Starkey, both of Klamath Falls, welterweights, will meet in the eight round main event at Chiloquin tomorrow night.

Both boys need no introduction in Klamath. Starkey has perhaps fought more main events in Klamath than any other fighter here, and bears the singular reputation that not one of his fights was a "stop."

The fighting carpenter is one of the most popular pugilists to ever enter a Klamath ring for the reason that he has never been known to take a backward step, or to flinch.

In Fugate, Starkey will meet a man of his mettle. Fugate is a ring veteran, fast, willing and with an amazing faculty of tying up an aggressive opponent in the clinches.

Both boys have their following and the bleachers will be full of Klamath Falls partisans.

Pat McFadden, Weed, a willing mixer, who can take and give, will meet "Cyclone" Pearcey Walker in the semi-wind-up, in what will probably be one of those battering, bruising slugfests. Both boys have lots of courage and can assimilate much punishment.

Another Chance
Abe Tunney, Chiloquin, will be given another chance at Mike Daly, Pelican City lumber piler, in a four preliminary. In their first clash, they slugged for three and a half rounds and finally a crashing right sent Tunney to dreamland in the fourth.

Another preliminary will be between Eddie Peck and Dixie Henley, both willing mixers. Probably two Chiloquin boys will fight a four round preliminary.

Duck Disease Still Mystery

"We are just as much in the dark over the Tule lake duck disease as two years ago when it was first called to our attention."

This was the admission today of Ray C. Steele, United States game warden for Oregon, who has devoted several days to an inspection trip throughout southeastern and south central Oregon.

"However," the federal warden continued, "I'm glad to say that the spring outbreak on Tule lake—last April—has virtually disappeared and we are in hopes that this fall will not see another outbreak. The disease is manifest in the Salt River marshes in Utah and they are just as much in the dark there as we are here."

Steele said federal game authorities intended to keep a close check on the situation and would spare no effort to control the situation.

Traffic Census Will be Taken Tomorrow

First traffic census of the tourist season will be taken tomorrow on state highways in Klamath county. It was announced today by C. C. Seeley, resident state highway engineer of Klamath.

At principal road junctions and at the three highway entrances to the town, state highway census men will check the number and description of each auto throughout the day and part of the night.

Purpose of the census is to determine the volume of traffic state highways in Klamath are bearing. Previous censuses have indicated that Klamath macadamized highways are bearing the heaviest traffic of any macadamized roads in the state.

Klamath Will Maintain Bad Piece of Road

Klamath will cooperate with its neighbor, Lake county, in maintaining that part of the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway between Hwy and Drews valley, it was announced today by Horace Dunlap, county commissioner, following an investigation of the project.

County Judge Kelly of Lake county had offered a proposition whereby Lake county would keep the Quartz valley section open to traffic if Klamath county would follow suit in the Devil's Garden section.

"The road is in bad shape," Mr. Dunlap admitted, "and we will spend as much money as we can spare to have it repaired."

Maintenance work will be in charge of County Roadmaster Spidell.

The question of the legality of the purported alleged budget item came up time and again before the present county court last winter at a hearing at which Kuykendall, representing timber holders, attempted to have the crusing contracts set aside.

Complaint

Following is the complaint in part: "That during the year 1925 the defendants R. H. Bunnell and Burrell Short, constituting a majority of the county court sitting for the transaction of county business, made, published and on December 22nd, 1925, established, declared and adopted a budget for Klamath county for expenditure during the year 1926 making an appropriation for each office, officer, department, etc., and other purposes, among which other purposes was specific and separate item or appropriation of the sum of \$20,000 for crusing timber, all for expenditure during the year 1926.

"That a tax sufficient to produce the amount of said budget items was thereafter levied.

"That during the year 1926, defendants wrongfully and unlawfully conspired to defraud the plaintiff and the other tax payers of said county and in pursuance of said conspiracy made and entered into various deals and contracts for the crusing of timber to greater amount than said budget item and at an exorbitant and excessive price, presented and allowed bills therefor and obtained and cashed various county warrants of said county to the amount of \$29,989.

"That after the entire sum of \$20,000 appropriated in said budget for timber crusing had been paid to the defendants, Dave Edgar, R. F. Edgar and J. E. Cullison, doing business as Edgar and Cullison, in pursuance of said conspiracy, defendants, R. H. Bunnell and Burrell Short, as a majority of said county court, and against the vote of C. J. Martin, the other commissioner, on July 20, 1926, wrongfully and unlawfully attempted and pretended to make an additional budget item or appropriation of ten thousand dollars and thereafter wrongfully and unlawfully paid to the defendants, Dave Edgar, R. F. Edgar and J. E. Cullison, doing business as Edgar and Cullison, the additional sum over and above the said sum of \$20,000 to the extent of \$9,989, making a total payment by said county to said Edgar and Cullison for crusing timber during 1926 of \$29,989.
