The following Lakes are open for fishing tomorrow, June 15th:
Lake of the Woods
Odell Lake
Crescent Lake
East Lake
Diamond Lake will be open Sunday.

Klamath County—Crooked river closed. Fish lake and Maidu lake closed to April 15, 1929. Odell creek, from Odell lake to Davis lake, closed. Seven Mile creek closed to June 15 of each year. Spencer creek closed. Wood river and tributaries closed to June 15 of each year. Klamath river closed for a distance of 4,000 feet below and 2,000 feet above the mouth of Spencer creek. Link river closed for a distance of 200 feet below the dam owned by the California-Oregon Power Company.
