

Fugate Decisively Defeats 'Kid' Starkey in Eight Round Main Event; Pat McFadden Winner

In one of the biggest upsets in Klamath ring history, Johnny Fugate, ring veteran, decisively defeated "Kid" Starkey in the eight round main event of the Chiloquin fight card last night.

There was no question of the decision in the minds of any of the fans. Even the large group who had wagered 2 to 1 on Starkey to win, failed to crab.

Displaying an attack that dazzled the husky Klamath Falls carpenter, Fugate outboxed and outfought his opponent from the opening gong. His one-two blow and straight right cross landed time and again, shaking Starkey from stem to stem. In the fourth Starkey was groggy and staggering; in the eighth he was on the verge of a knock-out.

But despite the decisive win, the bout was declared to be one of the best ever staged in a Klamath ring. Fugate was a shade faster and quicker, showed better ring generalship, and kept a comfortable margin ahead all the time.

Starkey kept boring in, mulling around; Fugate would crack him

cleanly and still the "kid" would bore in for more.

Starkey's supporters flashed money trying to get 2 to 1 bets and much money changed hands. Fugate was considered to be the under dog by the ring side fans and his impressive wins has made him a main event attraction in Klamath county.

Pat McFadden, Weed, outpointed Percy "Cyclone" Walker, in the six round semi-wind up. It was a milling affair that started in slow and ended in a slugfest with McFadden on top of his opponent at all times.

Abe Tunney took a clean cut decision from Clarence Walker in a four-round preliminary. Tunney dropped Walker, a Beatty Indian, several times and was conceded three of the four rounds.

The opening event was a Battle Royal between four negroes. The last one up took the money. Two dusky-skinned walllopers were carried unconscious from the ring.

Approximately 500 witnessed the card. It is planned to re-match Starkey and Fugate July 4th.

Other Cities Oppose Change Of Road Name

Joining others towns including Klamath Falls along the route of The Dalles-California highway, The Dalles-Wasco County Chamber of Commerce has gone on record in opposing the plan of changing the name of the north-south highway, recently proposed by directors of the Bend Chamber of Commerce.

"We feel that after you have carefully considered the situation and taken into consideration the fact that the name has been long established and the route well advertised under its present name that you will quite agree with us that it is not to the interest of any of us to change the name," W. S. Nelson, secretary of The Dalles chamber, writes to L. K. Cramb, secretary of the Bend Chamber of Commerce.

"We cite the case of trying to change the name of the Columbia river highway to the Old Oregon trail," Nelson continues. "It has not been a success and results in considerable confusion. The Wasco chamber expresses its appreciation to the Bend chamber for bringing the matter to a head."
