will be started.

The Williamson River-Algoma
section of the highway has received
its first coat and will receive a
second coat next week; nine miles
of the Williamson River-Fort
Klamath section of the highway
has been oiled. That which has not
been oiled of this section will re-
ceive two coats and the nine mile
section will receive its second coat
and in some sections a re-treatment
with the first coat.

Next move of the highway oiling
crew will be to move to Klamath
Falls and start re-treatment of the
Klamath Falls-Algoma section of
The Dallas-California highway and
the Klamath Falls-Keno section of
the Ashland-Klamath Falls high-
way. Both these sections were treat-
ed last year.

Lake Could be Used As Bird Reserve and Grazing Area, Belief

Utilization of lower Klamath lake
bed as grazing area, an adjunct of
the Klamath Irrigation district,
would not jeopardize the bird re-
serve of that section, in the opinion
of Ray C. Steele, United States game
warden and connected with the United
States Biological Survey.

Creation of the grazing area, in
district depends upon the sanction
of the U. S. R. S. as that federal de-
partment holds priority rights.

By cooperation, Steele thought,
the tract could be used by the
sheepmen for grazing and by the

federal department, as a breeding
ground for wild fowl.
An instance of such cooperation
would be exemplified, he pointed
out, by sheepmen keeping their
flocks from the fringe of the
marshes during breeding season.

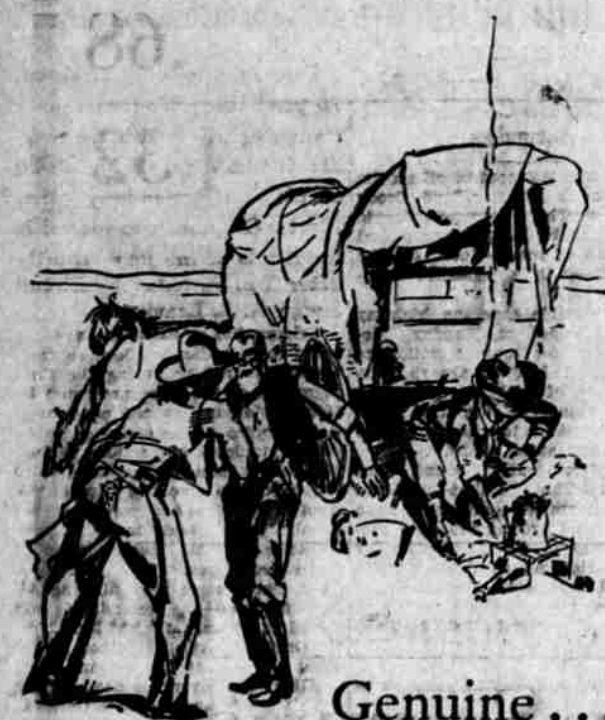
