SALE OF PAPER IS CONSUMMATED

Assets of Portland Telegram Transferred to D. E. Lofgren, Attorney

PORTLAND, Ore., June 9. (AP)—Sale of the Portland Telegram Publishing Company for \$226,000 was consummated Saturday when assets of the company were transferred to David E. Lofgren, Portland attorney.

Lofgren refused to state for whom he was acting, beyond the fact that Portland business men and capitalists had become interested through the offer of employees of the organization to subscribe approximately \$100,000 to the new organization. Lofgren further stated that publication of the Telegram, as a progressive, independent paper would be continued. Principles in the purchase probably will be announced when the new corporation is formed, it was said. Meanwhile, publication of the Telegram will continue under Lofgren until it is taken over by the corporation.

Highest Honor is Accorded Fliers

VIENNA, Austria, June 20. (AP)—President Hainisch of the Austrian republic, today conferred upon Clarence D. Chamberlin and Charles A. Levine the republic's highest order of merit, the "Goldenes Ehrenzeichen Der Republica," in recognition of their trans-Atlantic flight from New York to Germany.

The American aviators who arrived here with their wives last night from Munich, Germany, also were received by Chancellor Seipel. A military guard of honor today attended all their comings and goings in the Austrian capital, while great crowds gathered constantly outside of their hotel, eager to catch a glimpse of them.

Forbid Smoking In Modoc Forest

In order to prevent fires from careless use of matches and tobacco in the forests of California, all national forests have been closed to smoking except at camps and places of habitation, effective June 15. It was announced today by George Lyons, supervisor of the forest.

This order includes the Modoc National forest. The "shovel and axe" regulation has also been made general by the Secretary of Agriculture and applies to all auto and pack outfits
