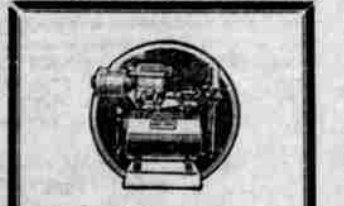

NEW BANK FOR KLAMATH FALLS

in view, the bank will operate its savings department entirely separate from its commercial business and no savings funds will be invested in unsecured loans or commercial transactions, but instead they will be invested in accordance with the tried and most approved savings bank laws.
"Funds will be invested only in first mortgage on improved real estate, secured bonds and similar securities.
"The original plan was to incorporate with a capital of \$50,000 and surplus of \$10,000; but because this amount has already been over-subscribed and there appears to be a desire from several citizens of the Klamath basin to become stockholders, it has been considered best to keep the subscription list open for another week."

Seek Temporary Site.

Negotiations are now in progress for temporary banking quarters and as soon as these are obtained, no time will be lost in securing suitable furniture equipment in order that the bank may commence business at the earliest possible date.
As soon as stock subscriptions are closed, a meeting of stockholders will be held for the purpose of electing directors and officers, the personnel of which will be announced in the near future.

The announcement follows weeks of preliminary work, preparing for the establishment of a third financial institution in Klamath Falls.

The bank will be over \$50,000 capitalization. Mr. Lindley and Mr. Duke will be actively identified with the venture.
Mr. Lindley is well known in southern Oregon. For 21 years he was identified with the Jackson county bank of Medford and was vice-president of the American National bank for 4 1/2 years. His reputation as a sound banker is widespread.

28 Years Experience.

Mr. Duke, first engaged in banking 28 years ago when he accepted a position with the Security State Bank of Palouse, Washington. At that time the late E. P. McCormack was president and his brother, J. K. McCormack, was cashier of the bank.
In 1904, Mr. Duke was elevated to the position of cashier and in 1909 assumed full charge. In 1921, he resigned to take office as supervisor of banking in the state of Washington. He later became vice-president of the Dexter Horton National bank of Seattle, which position he recently resigned.

The opening of the Indian lands for settlement by the whites is the epochal story of "3 Bad Men," which is now playing at the Pine Tree theatre.

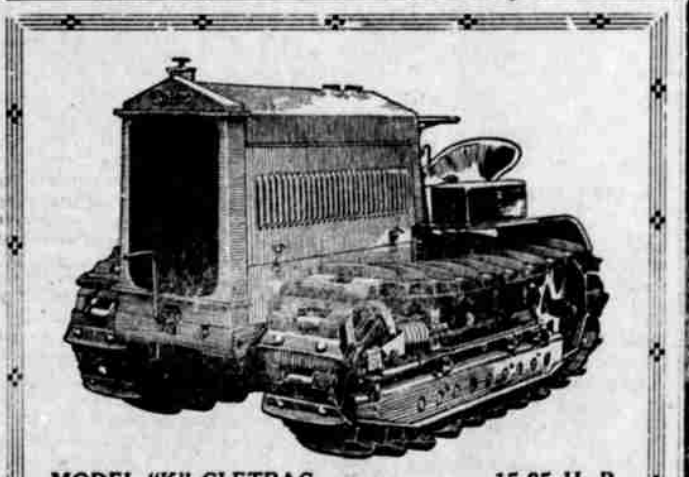
