## Closing the Nestucca

When you vote on June 28th you will see a bill on the ballot to close the Nestucca river to commercial fishing. It should be done. Not because more sportsmen want it closed than do commercial fishermen want it kept open, but because it is an economic problem.

The commercial fishing on Nestucca river has dwindled down to a very few who hope to keep a preserve for themselves and make money on the state fish. They want to take the fish supplied by nature and at will harvest that crop. The argument that closing the river to commercial fishing is a blow at labor is perfectly silly, for there is scarcely any labor employed there except the families of the few commercial fishermen who insist on keeping this river for the few to reap the annual harvest.

Broadly viewed, the state is entitled to protect its streams and where it seems advisable, commercial fishing can be stopped in the name of the state and for the good of the entire people of the state. That is the case in point. If Oregon is to permit every stream to be fished on by commercial fishermen the wild life of the state will soon be but a historic memory.

Every red blooded citizen who likes to catch a fish should vote yes on No. 322 at the special election and close the Nestucca river to the fish vendors.

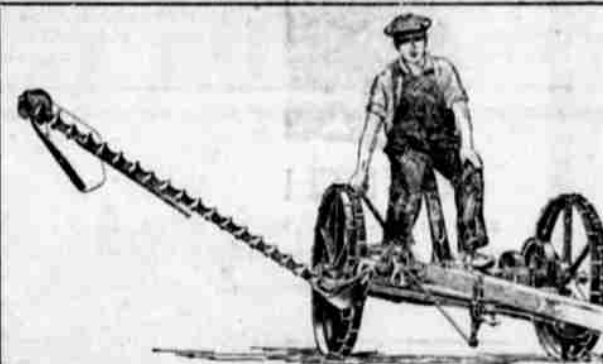

## McCORMICK DEERING is a High-Lift Mower

Extremely high lift is a feature of McCormick-Deering regular lift mowers. The driver can raise the cutter bar amply high with the foot lever to pass over most obstacles, or if a higher obstruction is encountered, the hand lever pulled back to the first notch usually raises the bar high enough. Extremely high lift can be secured with the hand lever in the second notch. This is more than is needed for any cutting except in stumpy fields. For cutting among trees, rocks, and around buildings, the vertical life mower should be ordered.

With the 5-ft. mower, by placing the hand lever in the second notch, the cutter bar can be raised so that the outer shoe is 44 1/2 in. above the ground and the inner shoe 13 in. above the ground. There is no detent to grip on the raising and lowering lever. Just pull the lever backward or push it forward. The latch falls into place in the segment automatically.
