NUISANCE WILL BE CORRECTED

City Engineer Don J. Zumwalt reported that the Tenth sewer unit, undertaken by the Oregon Construction company, had been completed. Standard hydrants at the intersections of Prospect and Ninth streets, Rose and Mt. Whitney streets and East and Canby street should be installed to guarantee property holders maximum fire protection. Fire Chief Ambrose told the council. A committee will investigate the suggestion and report next Monday night.

To Cut Pavement.

Permission was granted to the Klamath Oregon Power company—subject to city regulations—to cut the pavement at the intersection of Ninth and Prospect streets, Prospect and Rose streets and Sixth and Willow streets.

Petition of A. R. Wiseman and C. A. Lee to start a dance hall in the O'Neil building at Eighth and Klamath avenue was tentatively granted, subject to the raising by the petitioners of the \$1,000 indemnity bond.

Petition of R. P. Oliver to erect an electric sign on the McCarthy building on Seventh street was referred to A. L. Rice, building inspector. A petition of Dr. E. E. Dietzsch to erect a wooden sign on the Sugarman building was referred to a committee. The council frowned upon Dr. Dietzsch's sign, holding that erection of wooden signs

The council suggested that the project be undertaken through the regular form of petition.

Revealing their intention to erect a water tank on city heating plant property, Lorens Plumbing company representatives asked what regulations would govern the installation.
Report that the sewer on Rogers street had been broken was referred to the city engineer and street commissioner.

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IT COSTS money to construct and maintain refrigerator cars and keep them in transit. Yet shippers of foodstuffs do it because it saves money.

Cars laden with food often pass through widely varying temperatures on the way to market. Ice keeps the food in prime condition—in the condition you demand when you buy it for your table.

Purposely, you will not allow food which comes to you fresh and wholesome, to deteriorate before it is eaten by your family. But that is very likely to happen if you depend upon variable weather to govern the temperature at which your food is kept.
