STUDENTS WORK FOR EDUCATION

LOS ANGELES, June 28, (UP)—A desire for higher learning is causing a greater percentage of young men to work their way through college than at any previous time in the history of American education, it is indicated in results of a survey conducted at the University of California in Los Angeles.

According to Professor Earl J. Miller, dean of men at the institution, 69 per cent of the entire male enrollment is either partly or wholly self supporting.

While carrying a full course of study, 138 of the men students are earning at least \$100 per month. More than 400 of the students are earning \$50 a month.

Professor Miller pointed out that the youths who are willing to work for their education here are similar to young men throughout the country.

"It takes grit and a high order of courage and ambition for a student to work as hard as many of these men are working and to care-

ry their studies successfully," he said. "They meet the test splendidly and I do not know that the generations of the past produced any finer lot of young men."

Among the more unusual occupations listed by the students were those of process server, police officer on the city force, dairy collector, stage hand, physician's assistant, hospital orderly, motion picture actor, telegraph operator, sign painter, pharmacist, masseur, baker and picture framer.
