GOVERNOR SAYS RETRENCHMENT IS INEVITABLE

an effort to compel the state to proceed with the construction of the normal school and the hospital. The tuberculosis hospital bill carried an appropriation of \$100,000 as voted on by the people and the legislature of this year appropriated \$225,250 more, and also appropriated \$215,000 for the establishment of the normal school. It must be remembered, however, some state officials point out, that the legislature appropriated nearly \$2,000,000 in excess of visible funds, figuring on the approval of the income tax by the people. Vetoes by Governor Patterson cut this excess over \$1,000,000, so the deficiency, according to state treasurer Kay, between the state tax levy and money appropriated by the legislature is still over \$1,000,000.

Should Governor Patterson oppose construction of the new normal school and the new tuberculosis hospital in order to conserve state funds his action would probably be based, it is understood, on the constitutional provision prohibiting the state to contract an indebtedness in excess of \$50,000.

Kay's Position.
State Treasurer Kay, who made his position clear today, would oppose such a policy of the governor. It is probable that Secretary of State Kozor would vote with the governor. Kay is a member of the board of control but not of the board of regents. Kozor and the governor are members of both.

"I take the position," said Kay, "that it is the duty of the board members to go ahead as the people or the legislature direct and not to raise questions of legality. Therefore I shall vote to go ahead with the establishment of the tuberculosis hospital. I am aware of the constitutional provision that the state shall not exceed an indebtedness of \$50,000. But there is also a provision that no county shall contract an indebtedness of over \$5,000, yet nearly every county in the state is in debt more than that, and the supreme court has ruled

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these legal indebtednesses. I believe the same ruling would hold for the state. I predict that if the boards should vote not to go ahead with the construction of the two new state institutions mandamus action would be brought to compel them to go ahead, and I believe the mandamus would win."

Governor Patterson, in declining to state what his policy would be, said he wanted first to confer with the other members of the two boards.

"The board of normal school regents will meet July 20," he said, "and the question will be settled at that time."
