RECORD BROKEN HONOLULU TRIP

bring the Hawaiian Islands, outpost of America's defense, within one day of the country's mainland. The fastest steamer traverses the broad waters of the Pacific, in which no land intervenes. In from five and one-half to six days.

Maitland and Hegenberger, by their successful flight, supplemented the pioneer work begun August 31, 1925, by their brothers of the navy. On that date three giant planes of the navy made the first attempt to cross the Pacific from San Francisco Bay to Hawaii. One plane failed to rise, another fell into the sea 300 miles off-shore, and the third, containing the heroic Commander John Rodgers and three other men, came down some 200 miles short of their destination. For nine days they drifted with their seaplane and were picked up when hope had been almost abandoned.

The flight ended today, exemplified the advance which aviation has taken. Whereas, the navy had found it essential to place a line of warships reaching from California's shore to the Hawaiian Islands, at frequent intervals, the army men flew without such support, and in a land plane that would have floated

two to three hours. They had, however, a pneumatic life raft. In their flight of approximately 2400 miles, Maitland and Hegenberger completed the longest trans-oceanic airplane flight ever accomplished.

The landing was made on a rain soaked field. The plane taxied the entire length of the field. Then, circling, it came back to the front of the review stand, where the highest army, navy and civil authorities in the island were waiting to extend congratulations to the flyers. The crowd, augmented by hundreds hurriedly returning to the field, went wild with joy and guns of fortresses thundered in salute as the plane stopped before the reviewing stand.

ing their terms of office, also apparently failed of passage, the vote being yes 35,607, no, 48,098.

Two measures affecting Multnomah county, one providing for increase in school taxes and one for consolidation of city and county governments were lost. The school tax vote being yes 36,752, no 44,394; and the vote on consolidation being yes 34,222, no 42,869.

4 Survivals.

Four measures apparently survived the onslaught of negative votes, these being the repeal of an obsolete provision of the state constitution denying negroes right to vote; a law doing away with swearing in voters at the polls; a law to permit speedy pleas of guilty in criminal cases, and a measure closing Nestucca Bay to commercial fishing. The figures on these measures were:

Negro suffrage, yes 53,194; no 32,154.
Registration yes 43,708, no 37,550.
Criminal amendment, yes 48,595, no 30,532.
Nestucca closing, yes 42,718, no 35,425.
