

CREWS ASSEMBLE TO START WORK ON S. P. PROJECT

\$2,000,000 Railroad Undertaking Underway Soon; Finished October 1

With crews assembling at Wendel

southern terminus of the N. C. & O.—work in standard gauging the Nevada, California and Oregon railroad, a project entailing the expenditure of approximately \$2,000,000, will be started on scheduled time shortly after July 1, according to special long distance communication from the Evening Herald's Lakeview correspondent.

The N. C. & O. controlled and financed by the Southern Pacific—is a narrow gauge line extending from Lakeview 154 miles south to Wendel where it connects with the S. P.'s Westwood-Fernley branch.

In an interview with P. H. McCarty, general manager of the N. C. & O. railroad, the Herald

correspondent learned that three crews of 120 men each would work on the project under the direction of A. E. McKenney, S. P. engineer who was in charge of construction work on the Cascade line.

The first crew will lay alternate gauge ties; the second will lay the new steel rails; and the third will ballast the road bed.

The work will be completed by October 1.

The new project is significant not only because it means the development and exploitation of Lake county resources, but because it indicates the early completion of the Modoc Northern railroad—a project which would extend from Klamath Falls to Alturas connecting with the N. C. & O. railroad and which would not be possible unless the S. P. subsidiary was standard gauged.

Veteran Thespian Is Growing Weaker

SAN FRANCISCO, June 29. (AP)—John Drew, dean of American actors, suffered a relapse yesterday in his fight against an attack of arthritis which seized him in Portland several weeks ago. His condition was reported extremely weak.

The report marks another turn in Mr. Drew's battle, which thus far has been a gradually losing one. He had a "fairly good" day yesterday, hospital bulletins said.

Several times since his confinement to the sick bed the 73 year old thespian has been reported on the verge of death.

Crater Entrance Roads May Not be Open by July 1st

The falling of a foot of snow in the Crater Lake national park Sunday, followed by freezing weather, presents grave danger that the entrance roads to the lake cannot be cleared for travel by July 1, the date for the official opening of the park.

Forty men are at work on the last four-mile stretch of snow between Anna springs and the lake, but as the drifts are six feet deep and practically solid ice, slow progress is being made. Weather in the park is still unsettled and indications are that more snow will fall.

The first contingent of lodge employees, about 20 persons, left Medford Monday morning for the lake. They will travel as far as possible by automobile and then haul their baggage and supplies the remaining distance over the frozen snow with sleds.

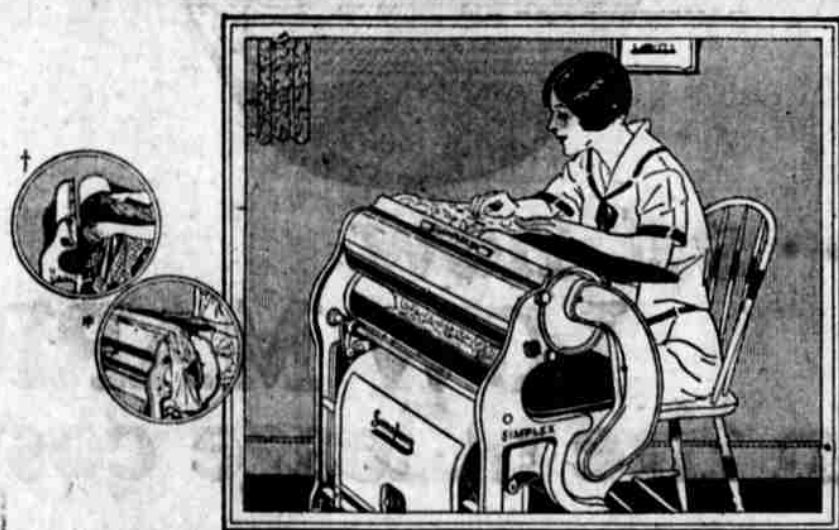
