Herald Progress Wins

Now that the canvas of the votes shows the county road bonds carried by a safe majority, the Evening Herald, with considerable satisfaction, calls attention to the fact that every measure on the state ballot advocated by this newspaper won and every measure opposed by the Herald lost. Don't think we believe that the Herald's influence is of sufficient magnitude over the state to bring this about when the Portland Oregonian and Portland Journal were gallantly fighting for the measures this newspaper opposed. But we do claim the Evening Herald has been right in its course. It has advocated nothing but sane and safe legislation and therefore kept in step with the thinking people, while some of its larger newspaper brothers were taken off their feet by hallucination and apparently thought the popular thing was to step across the lines of sound business and advocate what seemed to be wanted by the voters, but which in reality was repudiated at the polls.

The Salem Capital-Journal and the Klamath Falls Herald were two up-state newspapers that stood up and were counted from the very start of this income tax campaign. They were the only outspoken newspapers in the state for a long time that seemed to dare oppose what then seemed to be popular opinion, headed and nursed as it was, by the two large metropolitan dailies.

But, we have found that very often people think for themselves and it was so in this case. The statement that the metropolitan newspapers control elections got a fearful setback when the special election last Tuesday showed a complete repudiation of the metropolitan press, even in the county where both the large dailies are published.

In local affairs the Evening Herald stood by the road bonds because again we believed we were right. The people thought the same way and as a result the bonds carried.

With pardonable pride we call attention to the complete victory for this newspaper, and with some satisfaction we also call attention to the waning influence of the metropolitan dailies in the Oregon country.

The Evening Herald believes the voters have reached the parting of the ways and will no longer vote at the sound of drums and cymbals; neither will they follow guffaw editorials when such editorials are not based on good judgment. The whanging away of editorial harpstrings that are out of tune will not overcome the harmonious rhythm of sound, substantial thinking minds who join at the polls to vote the vagaries and foolishness out of Oregon politics and to make of this state an attractive place for developers and home-seekers.

If another demonstration is demanded let another special election be called and see what happens.
