could not be sure. When their gas and oil was nearly run out, Commander Byrd said, the America was headed in the direction where the sea was thought to lie in the hope that a safer landing could be made there than on unseen ground.

The commander said that the America was driven until the fuel was virtually used up. He sent down a flare and then followed with the plane.

Commander Byrd said that the plane struck shallow water and the landing gear was torn off. The plane quickly submerged to the wings to which the flyers clung until they succeeded in launching their rubber life boat.

As soon as this was done they took their instruments, personal effects and a sack of mail ashore where they waited two hours in the rain before they were discovered by the villagers and taken into their homes.

Commander Byrd estimated that he flew 4200 miles from the time of leaving Roosevelt field until his landing at Ver-Sur-Mer.

The commander expressed hope that he would be able to save his ship but aviators who had seen the plane today expressed the opinion that the hopes of salvage were slight as the plane was breaking up in the sea.

LIGHTING RAID STAGED BY COPS

Because Klamath motorists do not appear to be cooperating with state authorities in their attempt to enforce the lighting regulations, the next auto light raid to be staged in Klamath will be followed by arrests rather than mere warning slips.

This is the decision of Lieutenant O. O. Nichols of the state traffic force who with State Traffic Officer Walter A. Foster and City Traffic Officer Lee Craft stopped 23 cars at the corner of Sixth and Walnut streets last night and checked lights.

"Sixty-two per cent," Lieutenant Nichols related, "of the motorists stopped last night had lights that were all right. The other 38 were deficient in minor respects."

"We have no intention of working a hardship, but such a record as this means that action must be taken. We will arrange to have fines levied in police court. In justice court one has to pay a \$3.50 court cost outside of the fine and we do not want to be hard."
