Middle West No Longer Classes Game With Croquet and Ping Pong

KANSAS CITY, July 6. (AP)—The Middle West, which used to class tennis with croquet, is now taking a much greater interest in national tennis affairs. Six years ago the Missouri Valley Tennis Association was a district organization at St. Louis with a few scattered clubs. At the end of 1924 there were 81 clubs in the association, which was the fourth largest sectional tennis organization in the United States.

Joseph W. Ivy, president of Rockhill Tennis Club of Kansas City, and a member of the executive committee of the United States Lawn Tennis Association, is president of the Missouri Valley group. He has been one of the leaders in the development of the game west of the Mississippi and believes it will some day be almost as popular as baseball.

Dartmouth Hurdler Attains New Record in 45 Yards: 5 4-5

HANOVER, N. H., July 6. (AP)—Dartmouth, which has turned out some great hurdlers in its day, has produced another worthy successor to the famous Earl Thompson. He is Eber Montgomery Wells, better known as "Monty" Wells.

This bespectacled youth set a world's record for the 45 yards high hurdles when he topped the timbers in 5 4-5 seconds. This was at the Knights of Columbus indoor games in Boston some months ago. Wells recently helped Dartmouth to an I. C. A. A. A. title when he won the 120-yard high hurdles at Philadelphia.

SERGEANT BAKER AFTER CROWN OF NEW CHAMPION

Joe Dundee In For Hot Time to Hold Recently Gained Laurels

NEW YORK, July 6. (AP)—Joe Dundee, the new welterweight champion of the world, has plenty of opposition in sight if he contemplates a busy campaign in defense of the crown. Not the least of the Baltimore Italian's rivals is the walloping soldier, Sergeant Sammy Baker, who jumped into the limelight by stopping the Nebraska "Wildcat," Ace Hudkins.

Hudkins had been knocked down, but never out, nor had he been stopped by any foe until he met the rushing, two-fisted Baker.

Sergeant Sammy, a youngster with lots of stamina and courage as well as punching ability, has come from the Army ranks in rapid fashion to make his mark in the 147-pound division. He is a product of Mitchell Field, N. Y. He holds decisions over such men as "K. O. Eddie" Roberts, the Tacoma sensation who knocked out Joe Dundee in a single round at San Francisco; Georgie Ward and Joe Simonich, the Montana miser.

British Tennis Stars Succumb to Money Lure

LONDON, July 5. (AP)—Five leading British tennis players have decided to turn professional, according to Mr. E. R. Cochran, sports promoter.

Some of them will appear with Suzanne Lenglen in Glasgow early in July in one of a series of professional exhibition games to be staged by Cochran. The identity of the players will not be made known until after the All-England tournament at Wimbledon. Mrs. L. A. Godfree, the Wimbledon champion, who is the only British woman player considered capable of giving Lenglen a game, has stated that she has no intention of abandoning her amateur status.

Grave of Faithful Horse Carefully Tended by Owner

SANTA ROSA, Cal., July 6. (AP)—Within the shadows of the stables of the great Rancho Wikipup near here is a grave cared for as diligently as those in the city cemeteries. It holds the remains of one of America's famed race horses—Disguise, a true son of equine aristocracy, who died at the noble age of 30 years.

Only last fall John H. Rosseter, owner of Disguise, gave a birthday party for the horse. Some 200 sportsmen and society people attended. Refreshments for Disguise included a cake 19 feet wide, prepared of bran and oats, with carrots taking the place of candles.

In 1900 this thoroughbred in a gallant bid for Epsom Derby honors placed third to Diamond Jubilee.
