Orderly Grazing

We had last night at Merrill a representative body of Klamath county citizens who gathered for the purpose of forming a Grazing Association to handle the pasture lands of the lower lake. They expect to lease that large tract of excellent pasture land from the United States government and use it for the people who have rights as water users, land owners and livestock operators. The intention is to prevent large speculation and to encourage the home bands of sheep to the ranchers of the project.

It is a splendid move and one which the government has indicated it favors. Orderly grazing is essential for many reasons. If there is no organized body responsible the pasture will be over-grazed at times, there will be crowding, there will be lack of respect shown for property rights and chaos will follow.

Unquestionably the old statement that honest men will steal range and water holds true yet, hence a proper police system for the lake bed has been provided for in the by-laws adopted last night.

The whole plan has been worked out by practical men and we believe it is now a question of working out further detail and the big Lower Klamath Lake will begin to serve the public in a way that it never has before.

Police Enrich City Treasury \$44.80 a Day

Not including dozens of traffic violators who were haled before the police judge, arrests made by the Klamath Falls police department during the month of June totaled 50, it was revealed last night at a meeting of the city council.

In round numbers the income from police court fines totaled during the month the sum of \$44.80 a day, or a total during the month of \$1343.

As usual vagrants and drunks proved to be the greater number. The report is segregated as follows: Vagrants, 36; drunks, 38; possession of liquor, 8; fighting on the

streets, 3; breaking glass on the pavement, 2; reckless driving, 2; and disturbing the peace, 1.

Most of the 36 vagrants were arrested, fined and sentenced, only to have the fine and sentence remitted if they would agree to leave town; which they invariably did. In addition to fines, the police department collected \$46.50 in dog licenses.

Fire Loss \$93.95 During Past Month

A telling blow against the menace of fires was struck during the month of June when total loss sustained in five blazes during the month aggregated \$93.95, a monthly report to the city council last night revealed.

The one actual loss sustained was at the Imperial garage on June 21. Other calls during the month in

which little or no damage was incurred included, 102 Lincoln street on June 4; Big Lakes Box company, June 14; 615 Conger avenue, June 17; and Third and Oak streets, June 21.
