Klamath Gets Help in Move For Newcomers

Two powerful agencies—the land settlement committee of the state chamber and the land settlement and publicity departments of the Great Northern railroad—pledged themselves to expedite and aid the move in Klamath for more settlers.

If ever a group of men were "sold" heart and soul on the Klamath basin agricultural land, it was the group comprising the state chamber land settlement committee, headed by Whitney Boise, Portland.

They said that Klamath was at the ideal stage for development for two reasons: First, transportation facilities were being provided; and second, land had not reached a speculative value.

The committee favored a cross state line from Crane to Odell and an intersecting line from Lakeview north. Only through this means will Oregon save the great tonnage originating in Lake county, it was pointed out.

G. N. Pledges Help

L. C. Gilman, Seattle, vice president of the Great Northern, told the committee last night that the Great Northern land settlement department and publicity department would get behind the Klamath country and do all possible to bring new settlers to this country.

Klamath representatives who met with the land settlement committee included: L. C. Slesmore, Fort Klamath; W. F. B. Chase, Bonanza, Horsey Irrigation district; A. F. Tuttle, Willow Valley Irrigation district; Charles Drew, Merrill route; J. M. Kerns, director of the Klamath land settlement committee; L. Jacob, president of the Klamath Irrigation district board; A. M. Thomas, secretary of the board of directors of the Klamath Irrigation district; W. C. Townsend, director of the district board; A. R. Campbell, Lorella, Langell Valley Irrigation district; and Walter Smith, Langell Valley Irrigation district.

Cooked Cream Dressing

1/2 cup Mazola	1/2 teaspoon cayenne
3 tablespoons Karo, Red or Blue Label	4 tablespoons Argo or King'sford's Cornstarch
1/2 teaspoon dry mustard	2 eggs, beaten
1 teaspoon salt	1 1/2 cups top milk
1/2 cup very mild vinegar	

Combine the Mazola, Karo, the dry ingredients and the eggs in a double boiler top. Gradually stir in the milk which should be scalded, and cook over hot water, stirring constantly until thick like white sauce; then gradually add the vinegar, heated, and beat with an egg beater until the mixture thickens again. This may be used with any meat, fish, egg or vegetable salad.
