Giving Society a Chance

There is something worth thinking about in what Mary B. Grossman, judge of the Morals Court, Cleveland, said at the biennial convention in Kansas City, Mo., of the international legal sorority, Kappa Beta Pi, when she declared that there is a great need in the United States for education leading to sane thinking about crime and law enforcement. Always there are those, she urged, who seem to want a 75-25 break for the criminal, instead of wanting to give society an equal chance in the dealing out of justice.

In further deploring what she characterized as the attempts to make heroic figures of offenders against the law, Judge Grossman let it be seen that she has no patience with the efforts that have seemed to gain considerable popular approval of late to make such delinquents assume the role of much-abused individuals instead of criminals. Just so long as a glamour is allowed to surround those who have broken the law, law-breaking will be popular with a certain class of people. And the sooner they are made to realize that there is nothing in the least commendable in such activities, the sooner society will be saved from their depredations.

Judge Grossman was emphatic in her denunciation of this "weaving a halo about the heads of offenders," for she said that, in pleading for the constitutional rights of such law-breakers, there is danger of losing sight of the constitutional rights of society, the right of society to protect itself and its right to insist that all law be observed and enforced. As a matter of fact there is nothing that merits the slightest applause in law-breaking activities, says an eastern daily as it relates the story and then comments as follows: The law represents the carefully balanced opinions of those trained to such judgments, and until rescinded must be seen as pointing to the course to be followed as right. Law enforcement is one of the greatest needs of this century, particularly in the United States, and in stressing the fact that the sensational press and a falsely educated public is transgressing the rights of society, Judge Grossman has called attention to a fact that merits the closest attention of thinkers everywhere.

Can't Understand Tom Kay

The statement has been made that State Treasurer Tom Kay is in favor of proceeding with the state building program regardless of whether there is any money to meet the payments.

He is said to view the matter in the peculiar light that the people ordered the buildings built and it is up to the Board of Control to build them, even though they are erected on a warrant basis.

A warrant basis means that all costs will be paid by warrants marked "not paid for want of funds."

This is entirely foreign to Tom Kay's history and record. He has always been a safe, conservative official, who cautioned the public when extraordinary expense was being contracted and tried to urge people to live within their means.

Oregon will not stand any building program on a debt basis. The officials who sincerely believe they are carrying out the mandate of the people by such a program, should consider the latest edict of the same people when they voted heavily against more debt.

It is proper for the Board of Control to take the last verdict as final and refuse to build, also refuse to contract any other expense that is not necessary to care for the state's wards or to transact the needed business of the state.

No Summer Slump Here

Most towns feel a summer slump in business. Klamath Falls goes her best when the weather is warm, when the logging camps are working, when the ranchers are harvesting and when city improvements are going merrily onward.

No summer slump is due in this city this year, nor next year, nor for years to come. What slow times we experience in this city comes in early springtime and they are largely due to weather conditions, but the summer is the great season of activity.

Heavier logging forces are now being put on in the woods and on every hand things look better daily, even though it is a year that, generally speaking, is considered slow throughout the west.

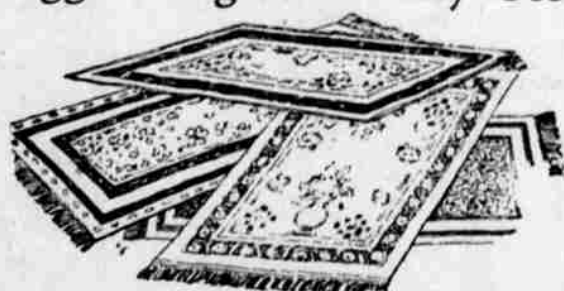

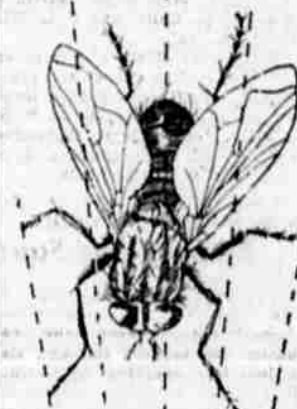
