LYTLE ADAMANT OVER EMBARGO

Regulations Governing Importation of Baby Chicks Will be Maintained

CORVALLIS, Ore., July 8. (AP)—Oregon has no intention of backing down in the matter of an embargo against diseased baby chick shipments from outside states said Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, in an address at the convention of the Oregon section of the international baby chick association in session here.

Even should a court attack on the Oregon embargo be successful, congress doubtless will give additional control to the states this fall, as was done in plant quarantine matters, Dr. Lytle said. He denied that the Oregon embargo was aimed at any particular state.

Hatcherymen here generally condemned mail service on baby chick shipments as being flagrantly careless, as compared with express

handling, though some fault was found with the latter.

The Oregon poultry association annual convention opened today on the Oregon Agricultural College campus.
