

HUGE RAILROAD MERGER IS NOW BEFORE I. C. C.

definite application did not deal with the subject, the corporation also contemplates control of the 11,400 mile system of the Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railroad, which is now jointly owned by the Great Northern and Northern Pacific.

25,000 Miles Of Road
The new company, if the commission approved the project, will own or operate approximately 25,000 miles of trunk line railroad and will become by far the largest railroad system in the United States.

Preparation of plans for the consolidation has been in progress for several months. Some opposition to the program has been indicated by the interests of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul railroad which operates through the center of the territory covered by the consolidation plans.

All of the railroads which the new corporation proposes to absorb are included in the group known as Hill railroads, because of the former predominance in their affairs of the late J. J. Hill.

"In the multitude of my activities it has been impossible for me to devote personal attention to the management or keep informed as to their contents. It has therefore inevitably followed that the conduct and policies of their publications had to be delegated to men whom I placed in charge of them and upon whom I relied implicitly.

"To my great regret I have learned that Jews generally, and particularly those of this country, not only resent these publications as promoting anti-semitism, but regard me as their enemy. Trusted friends with whom I have conferred recently have assured me in all sincerity that in their opinion the character of the charges and insinuations made against the Jews, both individually and collectively, contained in many of the articles which have been circulated periodically in the Dearborn Independent and have been reprinted in the pamphlets mentioned, justifies the righteous indignation entertained by Jews everywhere toward me because of the mental anguish occasioned by the unprovoked reflections made upon them.

Investigates.
"This had led me to direct my personal attention to this subject in order to ascertain the exact nature of these articles. As a result of this survey I confess that I am deeply mortified that this journal, which is intended to be constructive and not destructive, has been made the medium for resurrecting exploded fictions, for giving currency to the so-called protocols of the wise men of Zion which have been demonstrated, as I learn, to be gross forgeries and for contending that the Jews have been engaged in a conspiracy to control the capital and industries of the world, besides laying at their door many offenses against decency, public order and good morals."

BUDD SAYS NEW LINE WILL BE AID TO STATE

result from our extension of railway transportation facilities to the Klamath Falls region. The district which we will serve is rich in natural resources and with transportation they will develop rapidly. Of course the timber is the big thing, and while there is not now any great demand for lumber, it ultimately will be marketed.

Work Proceeds.
"The Hauser Brothers Construction company is proceeding rapidly with the work of grading and when that is completed track laying will start. It will be approximately six months before the line is finished. Obtaining rights of way delays us a little."

Asked if his company plans extending its lines south from Klamath Falls into California, President Budd said:

"Klamath Falls is our only objective. That is positive for the present. Our company has no other plans, although we do not know what the future may bring forth."

Inspects Shovel-Hixon.
The party inspected the Shovel-Hixon logging road which extends for 23 miles south from Bend and which the Great Northern has purchased as its first unit of the extension. It will be necessary to reconstruct much of this line.

The party found time to motor to Crater Lake, the first time in 15 years that President Budd has visited that scenic point. "We found the road in good condition, many people in Crater Lake National park, the tourists' camps full and all enjoying themselves," said President Budd. "There was about 15 inches of snow in the park. The mountains and the scenery around the lake were very beautiful."

President Budd believes that if the Great Northern, Northern Pacific unification plans go through, the extension of the Oregon Trunk which the Great Northern is financing, would become a part of the unified system and not maintained as an independent line.

Word of Encouragement.
"I just want to say a word of encouragement to Portland and other sections of the Pacific northwest," said President Budd.
"Throughout the middle west, the inland empire and the Rocky mountain districts, prospects for bumper crops are splendid. Farmers should reap big returns from this year's crops. This means prosperous farmers with greater buying power. Undoubtedly this will be pleasing information for your lumbermen and merchants."
