Here from all parts of the county as well as from greater distances. After the invocation by the Rev. D. V. Haight of The First Presbyterian church, the story of the South Emigrant Road was told in a splendid manner by Captain O. C. Applegate, who also read the quotations from the "Journal of the South Road" by his father, Captain Lindsay Applegate, a member of the locating party.

From Alturas. A delegation of five members from Alturas Parlor, daughters of the Golden West, was headed by Mrs. Emma Laird, Grand Trustee, who brought greetings from Alturas Parlor and the Grand Parlor of the organization, and made an impressive address on the fitness of marking historical spots and remembering pioneer virtues.

R. C. Groesbeck, Klamath Falls attorney, in the principal address, spoke of the American pioneer as a new type of man developed on this continent and extolled the qualities possessed by him which should not be lost to the race through our modern love of comfort and convenience. Reminiscences were given by Lewis A. McArthur, prominent Portland business man and secretary of the State Geographic Board. His mother, Mrs. Harriett K. McArthur, was also an honored guest of the occasion.

Veil Lifted. As the veil was lifted from the monument by little Rosemary Sloan and Fred Glover, Jr., members of General Canby chapter, Children of

the American Revolution, the national colors were unfurled by Arthur Moore, president of the chapter. After singing of the Star Spangled Banner led by Mrs. Don J.
