Consolidation Rumors Heard; New Top Prices

NEW YORK, July 12. (AP)—Constructive forces were again at work in today's stock market, which responded to the prospects of roof crops and a continued ease of money rates. Pools, plentifully supplied with funds, lifted more than a score of issues to new peak prices for the year.

There was a persistent demand for the stocks of carriers identified with consolidation gossip. New peak prices for the year were registered by St. Louis southwestern common, Chicago and Eastern Illinois common, Kansas City southern and Louisville and Nashville.

New High.

Railroad equipments moved forward under the leadership of Baldwin and Westinghouse electric, both at new highs. Among the many other issues to break through their previous peak prices were American can, Lambert, Gotham silk hosiery, Air reduction, Mathieson Alkali and Sterling products.

The closing was strong. Union carbide, National lead, Atlantic refining, Sterling products and South Porto Rico sugar (old) were among the specialties elevated four to five points. Collins and Alkman, however, dropped about seven.
