

WILL DEDICATE HIGHEST BRIDGE

R. C. Groesbeck, Klamath Attorney, Will Give Address at Meeting

The Crooked River Bridge, located 25 miles from Bend, reputed to be the highest highway bridge in the world, will be formally dedicated on Friday afternoon, July 15 at 2:30.

Rollo C. Groesbeck, representing the Klamath county chamber of commerce, will be one of the principal speakers of the afternoon, at which scores of local residents plan to attend.

The bridge is completed at a total cost of \$120,000 and covers a total length of 506 feet. Of beautiful architecture the bridge stands 204 feet above the water and measures 24 feet in width.

In completing the bridge more than 410 tons of structural steel was used, with reinforcement of 55 tons. Peter Skene Ogden, for whom the park between the railroad and the highway bridge over the Crooked River canyon is named, was born at Quebec, in the year 1754. He first came to Oregon in 1823 and was the first white man to explore central and eastern Oregon. His travels took him up the Deschutes to the Crooked river, and to the John Day, the Malheur, Owyhee, Powder and Burnt rivers. He explored the Harney valley and the Klamath Basin and discovered Mt. Shasta and Mt. McLoughlin. On his first trip up the Deschutes in 1825 he reached the Crooked river, not far from the present park. He became an American citizen when the provisional government of Oregon was formed. He passed away at Oregon City in 1854, and is remembered as one of the state's great pioneer figures.

(Continued From Page One) ficult stretch of territory lies between Butte Falls and the north, a distance of seven miles. This is largely through their timber holdings, where they contemplate building a logging railroad line.

"The rest of the way is good going with a minimum of rock cuts, and I don't think a half dozen trestles would be necessary," continued Mr. Owen. "There is one place in the Little Butte section, where the P. and E. surveyors make a loop of three miles to cover one mile in order to maintain a road grade which might be eliminated."

Mr. Owen was reluctant to go into details on the data that he had collected on the project, except that a cruise of the timber available for tonnage showed a variety, "with some of the best stands in southern Oregon." He further said, that it was his intention later of making tentative rail surveys, looking into the Jenny Creek country, as a connection with some of the Klamath Falls railroads. This section has a heavy stand of pine.

No Significance. Mr. Owen stressed the fact, during the interview that his trip over the country "held no significance."

"Of course, it is within the range of possibility the Hill lines or some other railroad might tap this rich section," he added. "There is no use to excite the public with rumors of railroad building."

The Owen-Oregon company owns a large amount of timber that could be economically marketed, with railroad facilities, by building a short railroad line to the southeast. There are also large saleable areas in the Crater Lake National Forest reserve, joining the timber holdings of the Rogue River Timber company and the Owen-Oregon Lumber company.

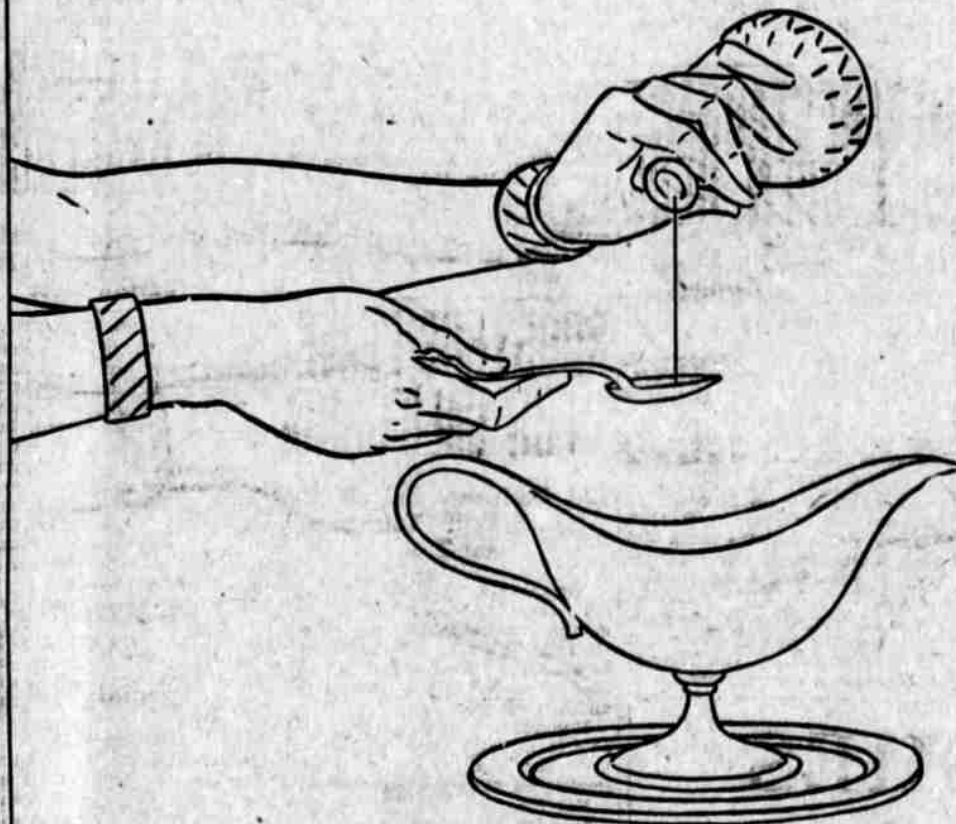
