Political Phophets Can't Fathom Ike

SALEM, Ore., July 12. (A.P.)—Political prognosticators indulging in their "dog day" speculations as to the probable trend of Governor Patterson's appointments are all at sea as to the likely selection for budget commissioner, a \$6,000 job authorized by the last legislature at the request of the governor but never yet filled, says the Capital Journal today.

The dopesters about the state house had it all arranged that Sam Koser would resign as secretary of state and accept appointment to the budget post, the paper says, but something has upset the arrangement. This morning Governor Patterson admitted to the Capital Journal that Koser had been tendered the appointment but had refused it, and Koser admitted that such was the case, explained his refusal to relinquish his present position on the ground that he had been elected to the office by the people and felt that he should serve out his term.

Koser's action in sidestepping the budget appointment is construed among the students of things political in Oregon as giving color to recent reports that he contemplates being a candidate for state treasurer in the 1928 elections, says the Journal. There is a general understanding that T. B. Kay, present treasurer, will not be a candidate for reelection, but will rest for two years before trying for gubernatorial honors in 1929. Kay is non-committal when questioned as regards his political ambitions.

Koser's action in declining appointment as budget commissioner takes a lot of rest out of the complicated guesses of the ring speculators, in that they visioned the prospects of a complicated under cover contest for appointment to the vacant office of secretary of state with Hal Hoos, present secretary to the governor; Carl D. Gabrielson, chief of the state motor vehicle division and Roy Ritter of Pendleton, former president of the state senate as spirited contenders. This new development postpones the clash between the three forces to the republican primary of next spring with definite assurances that at least Hoos and Gabrielson will be candidates for the nomination. house are frankly admitting now that they have not the slightest idea, the Capital Journal says. But there is a gradually growing opinion that Governor Patterson may undertake the task of supervising the budget making job himself by annexing one or two more clerical assistants to his own office force.

The office of Budget Commissioner comprises the only major appointment remaining in the governor's hands, as it is generally understood that his reorganizing of the highway commission has been completed with the replacement of Wade Maloney by C. E. Gates, and Wm. Daby by Robert Sawyer, and that H. B. Van Duxer of Portland will remain on the board although he is a democrat.

There is some speculation as to what the governor intends to do with the state fair board, but it is generally believed that he will leave the board as it is until after this year's fair in September.
