



Sharkey Says After He Whips Dempsey Championship Battle Must be Staged in New York

NEW YORK, July 14. (AP)—Jack Sharkey is just about down to fighting weight for his 15-round contest against Jack Dempsey.

Under a broiling sun, Sharkey yesterday worked off four pounds in a short sparring session, some rope jumping and shadow boxing, because of the fear of getting too fine the former sailor abandoned his usual road grind in Central park.

"When I whip Dempsey, I am going to insist that the championship fight be held in New York," Sharkey said. He didn't use the word "if." He said he had fought his way to prominence in New York, had beaten Wills, McGuire and Maloney in local rings and would demand that New York fans get to see the Tunney bout.

Tex Rickard has been considering Chicago for the championship fight. Dissatisfied.

Commissioner Wm. Muldoon of the New York commission was not satisfied with Sharkey's workout, expressing the belief that the Bostonian was taking too many chances by his willingness to absorb punishment from his sparring partners. Muldoon thought Sharkey ought to be perfecting his speed.

Sharkey plans to enter the ring against Dempsey weighing 192. From now on the Lithuanian's workouts will be lighter. Sparring will be cut short but the morning road work probably will continue right up to the day before the battle.

TERRIFIC PUNCH OF OLD RETURNS TO J. DEMPSEY

Black Scowl of Heyday Returns to Ex-Champ's Visage

SARATOGA LAKE, N. Y., July 14. (AP)—Flashes of old-time tigerish ferocity, reminiscent of the days of Toledo and Boyles Thirty Acres, indicate that Jack Dempsey is well advanced on the road that may lead to the most sensational comeback in ring history.

With a lone week remaining before Dempsey meets Jack Sharkey in the Yankee stadium, an ever increasing inclination to drop boxing lessons for the sheer joy of crushing a sparring partner appears daily in the former champion's workouts. The black scowl so characteristic of the heyday days as Jack feels the growing tenseness of perfect fighting trim.

The drawn face of the Dempsey of 1926, when legal difficulties beset him, has given way to the old fighting visage and the rest of Jack's physical makeup seems to have followed out.

Has Big Punch.

Despite the constant effort of Jack's handlers to hold him to the grind that comprises learning a defense for Sharkey's cutting left hand, Dempsey showed yesterday that he was able to keep in leash the terrific punch that he knows is again in his massive fighting machinery.

After following faithfully the defensive advice of his manager and ring tutor, Leo P. Flynn, Jack suddenly loosed the full force of his lashing attack against the giant Indian Chief Metoquah and the full power of three booming lefts to the body quickly smashed the brave to the canvas. It was the second time in two workouts that Jack had flattened the big Oklahoman.

Slays Octopus



Armed with a jack, John A. E. Hook, a diver at Port Townsend, Wash., battled an octopus on the sea's floor for an hour—and won the fight. The diver was repairing a fish net when he sighted the devilfish, which was carrying off one of five men who sank with a tugboat a few days before. The fish was cut to ribbons before the struggle was ended and Hook brought the body to the surface.

One Mile of Road Oiled Yesterday

One mile of heavy coat of oil covered with rock screenings, was laid on the Klamath Falls section of the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway yesterday, state highway authorities announced this morning. Re-treatment of highways with heavy oil and screenings progresses slower than laying of the light coat of oil. Maximum that can be laid each day is two miles.

EXTENSION MAN OF O. A. C. DEAD

C. J. Hurd, Corvallis, Dies Suddenly Following Heart Attack

CORVALLIS, Ore., July 14. (A. P.)—C. J. Hurd, extension specialist on marketing and organization at Oregon Agricultural College and former representative from Lane county, died here last night of heart disease, age 63, following a week of illness, brought on, according to physicians, by overwork in connection with the organization of the prune industry during the last three months.

Hurd came to Oregon in 1898, engaged in farming at Santa Clara, near Eugene. In 1913 he was elected to the legislature and served one term. In 1917 he became county agent of Douglas county and promoted 3 years later to assistant county agent leader for the state. He entered his present position in 1923 and has been identified with cooperative marketing for the last ten years and active in all forms of farm organization work.

Hurd was advisory member on a committee of 9 to perfect details of the grower-packer prune marketing plan. He is survived by his wife and three sons and a daughter, all grown.

Radio Helps With Education Program

PORTLAND, July 14. (A. P.)—The radio has been especially helpful in the educational program carried out by the Pacific coast nurserymen. It was declared at their meeting today.

A reporting educational committee presented by C. B. Lewis, told of increased public interest in shrubs, fruit and flowers, due to the work of the association.

Today's session was devoted entirely to committee reports. Landscaping, reduction of standard rose varieties, the bulb industry were among the subjects discussed.

Let Farmer Enjoy Relief, Is Advice

MADISON, Wis., July 14. (A. P.)—The same forces which opposed the "radical" interstate commerce law when it was first proposed are those which now are fighting farm relief legislation, said Frank O. Lowden, former governor of Illinois, addressing the Wisconsin legislature.

These same forces he added, now give the interstate commerce regulations full credit for the great prosperity of the railroads, and the same beneficent result has come from grouping the country's credit under the federal reserve act.

Now, he said, it is the farmers' turn to be permitted to enjoy the benefits of stabilizing his market with the approval of the government.

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CONGRESSMAN'S SON DROPS OUT OF SIGHT

CHICAGO, July 13. (A. P.)—Cecil Hawley, a civil engineer, who claimed to be the son of Congressman Hawley of Oregon, has left no trace, as far as known, since he vanished from Chicago some time ago, after which it developed that two women claimed him as their husband.

Mrs. Andree Marcelle Hawley, to whom he was married in La Porte, Ind., on December 5, 1922, has filed suit for an annulment. She has written to Hawley's relatives and in that way Mrs. Belle Hawley of Salem, Oregon, heard of her. She had been married to Hawley for a number of years and had two children. Whether Hawley obtained a divorce before his marriage nearly five years ago, is not known here.

Mrs. Andree Hawley was born in Paris, France. At the time of their marriage Hawley gave San Francisco as his home.

SALEM, Ore., July 13. (A. P.)—Nothing is known here of the whereabouts of Cecil Hawley, Chicago engineer and son of Congressman W. C. Hawley of this city, who is reported to have vanished from his Chicago home some time ago leaving a wife, Mrs. Andree Marcelle Hawley and two children.

Hawley has not made his home in Salem for several years, although his first wife Mrs. Belle Hawley, has been living at the home of Congressman Hawley. Mrs. Belle Hawley says that she was married to Cecil Hawley 17 years ago, and that she has never been divorced from him. She refused to discuss the Chicago report that Hawley has a second wife living there, to whom he was married in 1922, and said that she contemplates no action against her husband.
