Poisoned Mussels Bring Five Deaths

SAN FRANCISCO, July 19. (AP)—Deaths resulting from eating poisoned mussels stood at five here today and 17 others were reported ill as a result of indulging in the sea food out of season. Eugene Murray, Walter Webb and Salvatore Forlizzi were yesterday's victims. Murray returned home Saturday night with some mussels he said a friend had given him. Mrs. Murray, having read of two deaths that day from poisoned mussels refused to prepare them but Murray cooked and ate them. He died in a hospital last night.

Health authorities pointed out that public warnings were issued some time ago when the season for mussels had ended, saying the food was unfit for consumption at this time of year.
