Sales of Cattle Show Big Increase

SAN FRANCISCO, July 19.—Sales of cattle for the California Cattleman's association during the past week again increased in volume and prices received by members continue to be steady, according to a report just issued by the association.

Good steers and bringing \$8 to \$8.25 f.o.b. shipping point, and good cows are selling at \$6 to \$6.25 f.o.b. Helfers are in strong demand at \$7 to \$7.25 and light calves are bringing \$10 to \$10.50 f.o.b. ranch. Sizeable strings of cattle continue to move out of the state.

According to Hubbard Russell, assistant director of the association, there is every indication of continued strong market price levels if producers continue to place well finished cattle on the slaughter market. A large percentage of cattle fattened this year, and half fat cattle are in demand for feeders at prices fully as strong as if sold on the slaughter market. Light, half fat cattle should not be placed

on the slaughter market, but should be kept on ranches until finished or sold as feeders. If sold on the slaughter market, they cannot be replaced by feeders from the range states at the price received.

Nervous Peace Now Prevails in Vienna

VIENNA, July 19. (U.P.)—Nervous peace today settled on the Austrian capital. The Palace of Justice is in ruins but the government announced that the severe riots of last Thursday would not interfere with the machinery of the law. Courts resumed today. Both the rebellious socialists and government are claiming a victory.

Sharkey Favored In Betting Odds

NEW YORK, July 19. (U.P.)—Reports of an injury to Jack Dempsey's left arm today caused a switch in betting odds for the heavyweight fight Thursday night between the former champion and Jack Sharkey. A week ago the odds on Sharkey were 6 to 5, and today they had risen to 13 to 10.

Early Campaign on Signers Predicted

O. A. C. Corvallis, July 19.—An early campaign for signers to the new prune marketing contracts was forecast by the committee of nine which went into immediate session following the second general convention session Saturday at which their amendments were sustained and at which the committee was constituted in power. The committee was instructed to prepare the contract forms and then, working through the full convention membership representing every district stage the campaign in time to handle the 1927 crop under the new grower-packer plan.

Following agreement by the private packers on an exact allocation of independent tonnage, all elements in the proposed scheme quickly agreed to other minor changes recommended as desirable by the committee. Meanwhile all parts of the five-fold report adopted at the previous convention except those parts of the organization plan specifically amended, remain as adopted. This report is now out in printed form and copies may be obtained free from the extension service.

The chief difference brought about by the amendments is in a simplification of the growers' federation whereby instead of having two growers groups all will be combined for the purpose of forming a pool. Meantime the cooperatives will receive an amount equal to the tonnage of their own members to begin with, but will be subject to an audit of sales at a specified time by the central marketing board of nine the same as will the private packers. If at that time 60 per cent of any quota is not disposed of, half of it may be reallocated among remaining cooperative or private packers. The element of competitive salesmanship is further enhanced by a provision that if any packer sells out ahead of the set date, he may call for a reallocation at once.

All packing and selling charges are to be paid for at a flat rate per pound. Thus if the cooperatives perform this service for a low amount their members will receive

a return from plant operation aside from sales returns. Standardization of the prunes and price determination remain as originally planned, while all contracts will be for two years with yearly withdrawal privileges thereafter instead of for one year as was previously provided, or five years as the packers preferred.

Condemned Men are On Hunger Strike

BOSTON, Mass., July 19. (U.P.)—Nicola Sacco and Bartholomew Vanzetti refused again today to eat breakfast when it was taken to their cells in the state prison. Thus the two men who are facing the electric chair for murders committed in 1920 continued the apparent hunger strike which began after their morning meal Sunday. At 8 a. m. today more than 48 hours had elapsed since either prisoner had taken solid food.

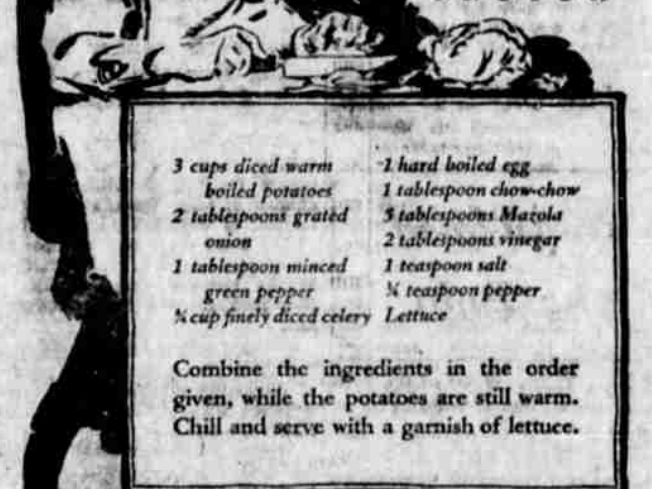
