Veterans Will Convene Here

The Veterans of Foreign Wars of Oregon will be guests of Klamath Falls in July, 1928, when more than 800 members from all parts of the state will convene in this city.

This was definitely decided at the noon luncheon of the board of directors of the chamber of commerce today, when an invitation was extended to the members by the directors in behalf of the chamber of commerce, who will cooperate with the local post.

Since the state convention, held this year in McMinnville, members of the state organization from all points have been desirous of coming to Klamath Falls in 1928. Inasmuch as the local post has but 40 members, this was not deemed advisable until it was known that the chamber of commerce and business men would support the post.

"To bring the convention here it will cost at least \$1,000 and the local post has offered to raise \$400 of this amount, providing the business men and chamber of commerce will back the boys," Commander Kelly explained to the directors.

Grant E. Getchell, Adjutant and Quartermaster of the Vets of Foreign Wars of Portland, spoke in behalf of the boys and of their desire to come here as did Judge Deich and Commander Robert Sawyer.

The visitors were introduced by Mayor T. B. Watters, who expressed a desire to have the convention come to Klamath Falls in 1928 and assured the directors he would assist in every way possible to make the affair a success.

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Will Exhibit Famous Craft

NEW YORK, July 19. (A.P.)—The trans-Atlantic monoplane, America, which during the reception to Commander Byrd and his associates yesterday lay dismantled and crated in the hold of the Leviathan, will have its day of glory in due time, John Gillespie, spokesman for the commander, announced today.

The storm battered ship will be rebuilt, he explained, and placed on exhibition, probably in Central Park, New York City.

Commander Byrd's plans for his next daring expedition are already taking definite form. A whaling ship, due here August 25, will bear the south pole expedition southward from Norfolk September 16, said Mr. Gillespie.

The plane in which the commander hopes to fly over the south pole, is now nearing completion at the Fokker plant, and is similar to the Josephine Ford with which Byrd conquered the north pole. In addition, two small scout planes will be used.

Snatching a moment now and then from the whirl of activities attending his return, the commander is preparing for publication of the data gathered on his flight to France. The report of the voyage of the America, which will be virtually official, will be submitted to the national geographical society for publication in the National Geographical Magazine.

Some of the official America were lost, one record lost being a record of the times at which the ship arrived at certain points and which also contained copious weather data that could not be incorporated in the log.

Several logs were kept, Commander Byrd said. One was kept by him. This was the same one he used on his north pole flight, and he told of saving it with a gleam of gladness in his eyes. "There's some things in it that will never be published," he said, smiling.

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Wealthy Packer Is Seriously Ill

CHICAGO, July 19. (A.P.)—The Herald and Examiner said today that J. Ogden Armour is critically ill in London and that his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. John J. Mitchell, Jr., are racing against time across land and sea to reach his bedside. The paper said that the packer was stricken with typhoid fever a week ago last Wednesday.

The Mitchells left Chicago last night on the second leg of their dash across the continent to make the Berengaria of the Cunard line, which sails from New York City at midnight tonight. They started last Friday, when they received a cablegram from Mrs. Armour at their summer home in southern California "to come immediately."

LONDON, July 19. (A.P.)—J. Ogden Armour, who has been seriously ill at the Carlton hotel, was believed today to have passed the critical stage and to be on the mend. He was still too weak, however, to see anyone but his wife. It is understood that his daughter and her husband, advised of his illness, are on their way to England. Mr. Armour has been attended by Lord Dawson, physician to the king.
