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Rumors of Injured Are Dispelled

SARATOGA LAKE, N. Y., July 20 (A.P.)—Circumstantial evidence has very nearly convinced Jack Dempsey of an injured left arm only three days before the former heavyweight champion must carry that highly potent weapon into combat with Jack Sharkey in the Yankee stadium.

But a single mute witness, a bulky leather sandbag of 200 pounds, left, slowly turned a battered face to a jury of newspapermen in the center of Jack's training ring and the charge of serious injury had to be dismissed. Official denial that Dempsey had suffered such a blow to his chances of conquering the Boston sailor man Thursday night might be incorrect, but there was no denying the evidence offered in Jack's behalf by the hapless bag after the workout yesterday.

Scarcely an hour after Jack, during a seven round workout, had smashed the bag for six whole minutes with a series of left hooks and vicious right crosses that sent the big sack flying almost to the ceiling, rumor spread through the camp that an injury to Dempsey's left arm had caused the lay off in training over the past week-end and had brought about the former title-holder's sudden decision several days ago to do no more boxing before the Sharkey melee. Manager Leo P. Flynn admitted the arm was "sore" and the cause for facts was on.

The final explanation was this: Several days ago, Dempsey, in protecting himself from the hostile advances of sparring partners caught several blows on his left arm. A slight soreness developed and Jack's handlers, following a procedure they always employ in treating stiff muscles, bathed the arm in liniment and bandaged it lightly to protect his clothing. The bandage itself had no more significance than the soft cotton stockings on a thoroughbred horse.

But one of the camp personnel, on grabbing Jack's arm playfully Sunday night, felt the bandage; the whisper passed from man to man for a day and finally into a full blown rumor after yesterday's workout. But the way Jack had slammed that bag shortly before ruined the story.

Although he worked with no sparring partners, Dempsey yesterday showed the newspapermen more power, savagery and speed than at any time in the training grind. For the first time in three weeks of training here, Jack appeared to have regained a good deal of his old time speed of foot.

Dempsey's training here ends today with a short lumbering workout. He will leave for New York by train tomorrow.

TOWANDA, Pa., July 20 (A.P.)—The contention of Mrs. Elizabeth Willets is that in 1914 when a bride she loaned her husband, she soon turned into millions, earning \$279,000 in one year alone as a New York contractor. CHERRY RAISERS SEEKING RELIEF

WASHINGTON, July 19 (A.P.)—Briefs in support of and in opposition to the petition of Pacific coast cherry growers for an increase of fifty percent in the tariff rate on Italian cherries were filed today with the tariff commission.

Backing up its request for the maximum increase allowed by law, the growers contended that the domestic cherry "fulfills the requirements for and is an actual and potential competitor with imported cherries for all Maraschino purposes."

They asserted that price barriers are now withholding from the domestic growers, domestic markets in which they had been entitled to compete. The National Preserver's Association, representing 26 eastern manufacturers of Maraschino type cherries, opposing the increase, charged the western growers were seeking to have the commission create an artificial market for their cherries, "so that the public and the trade will be forced to use the large and western cherry despite the established demand for the Italian fruit."

It was obvious, the association brief declared, that the western growers could not supply the demand now existing, without devoting several years to the development of a cherry comparable in size and texture with the Italian.

Nicaraguan Fight Still Continues

WASHINGTON, July 19 (A.P.)—The fighting at Ocotal, Nicaragua, where three hundred followers of General Sandino were reported killed, continued today to be the subject of agitation at the convention of the Pan American federation of labor, despite the explanation from the state department that the American forces involved were the objects of attack by bandits.

Coincident with receipt of official reports from Rear Admiral Sellers, commanding American naval detachments in Central American waters, praising the conduct of the marines and the Nicaraguan government troops engaged, delegates from the central American republic drew up a resolution at the labor congress asking that organization to go on record against "the presence and activities of the United States marine corps in Nicaragua." The resolution urged President Coolidge to order American withdrawal immediately.

WASHINGTON, July 19 (A.P.)—High commendation for the conduct of American marines and their air forces and the Nicaraguan guardia national was contained in the first official navy report made public today on the battle at Ocotal between the marines and the forces of General Sandino.

The report, forwarded by Admiral D. S. Sellers, commander of the American squadron in central American waters, said that Private Charles Sydney Garrison, who was wounded, still was in a serious condition, but "doing well" with hopes of recovery.

LEYDEN, Holland, July 20 (A.P.)—"Miss Louise Van Buren" is to study law and literature at the university here in the fall. Princess Juliana will register under that name.

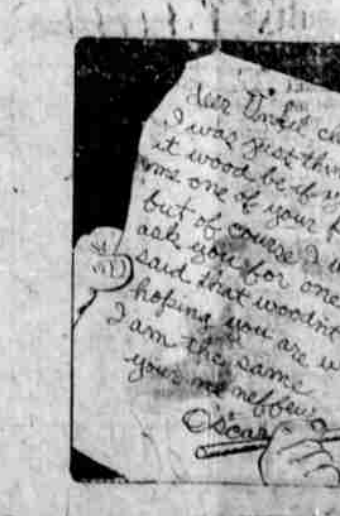
