

STATE NORMAL AT LA GRANDE NOW IN DOUBT

Board Refuses to Take Definite Action; Finances Cause Tangle

SALEM, Ore., July 21. (AP)—Unless four of the nine members of the board of state normal school regents can muster an additional vote and then ask the governor to call a special session of the board there is no prospect for the construction of the new normal school at La Grande this year and possibly not during the present state administration. With eight members present, and apparently evenly divided on the question, those who favored immediate construction withdrew their efforts when they saw that a vote by the members present would be fatal. Regent W. C. Bryout of Moro was absent, and how he would have voted is a question.

Instead, the board unanimously voted to defer action for the present. The law provides, however, that if three members petition the governor to call a special meeting he must do so and when the session adjourned it appeared possible that this might be done.

Action Halted.

The state financial snarl and the recent opinion of the state supreme court holding it unconstitutional for the state to go into debt over \$50,000 was at the bottom of the trouble. In voting to defer action the board adopted a resolution introduced by Secretary of State Kozier which read:

"In view of the recent opinion of the supreme court in the case of Pederson vs. the state board of control, and in view of the fact that such opinion declares that no indebtedness may be incurred by the state in excess of the limitation provided by the constitution but does not prescribe a method whereby the fiscal officers of the state may definitely determine when the authorized expenditures may exceed public revenues, be it resolved by the board of regents of normal schools that further action by the board of regents on the construction of the eastern Oregon normal school at La Grande be deferred for the present time."

Board Divided.

Had the question gone to a vote on the motion made by Frank Miller of Albany it was quite apparent that Miller, E. E. Bragg of La Grande, C. L. Starr of Portland and Fuller of Ashland, would have voted for it, while Governor Patterson, Secretary of State Kozier, State School Superintendent C. A. Howard and George Hartman of Pendleton would have voted against it.

Howard seconded Miller's motion, which was a motion that bids be called for, but the state superintendent later indicated that he did not want to see the matter go to a vote because of the opposition. A similar position was taken by Bragg.

"I move that we adjourn," said Bragg.

Kozier seconded the motion. Governor Patterson rebuked them by remarking: "Let's not act like a lot of boys." He refused to put the motion.

"I object to making the normal school a test of the state's building policy," said Bragg.

Everybody Satisfied.

"We aren't," Kozier replied. "We did that yesterday when the board of control voted down the nurses home at the state hospital."

"Sure, we declared our policy yesterday," the governor said.

Miller then withdrew his motion that bids be called for and Kozier's resolution was discussed at length before it was finally whipped into form that satisfied everybody.

Prior to taking up the question whether the school should be built the board adopted plans for the normal school building.

The implication of the Kozier resolution is that the board should await some official information as to how far reaching the recent supreme court opinion. There is still a possibility that the state board may ask a rehearing of the Pederson case.

Many Pheasants Are Liberated

PENDLETON, July 21. (A.P.)—The eastern Oregon state game farm has liberated 2400 Chinese and Mongolian pheasants in Union, Baker, Umatilla and Gilliam counties. Due to the abundant amount of feed in this part of the state, the birds are expected to thrive exceptionally well this year. Over 8,000 birds have been hatched at the game farm this year and other groups are to be liberated later. One hundred and seventy-five turkeys will be released by fall, according to officials.

ART GALLERY WILL HAVE A HINDENBURG ROOM

BERLIN, July 21. (A.P.)—The art gallery of Dessau, capital of the Province of Anhalt, will soon have a Hindenburg room.

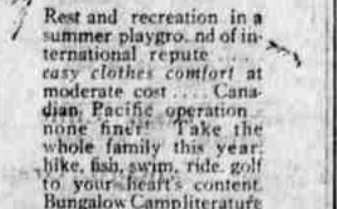
