### HUGH WALPOLE'S HOME IN TEACHERS' COLLEGE

LONDON, (AP)—Strawberry Hill, famous as the residence of Horace Walpole, has been turned into a Roman Catholic training college for teachers.

The opening ceremony was performed by Cardinal Bourne. The new educational centre, which has been named St. Mary's college, will provide accommodation for 200 students.

Strawberry Hill at Twickenham was bought by Walpole in 1747. The interior decorations and enlargements by him are churchlike in appearance. Some of the mantelpieces are replicas of tombs. One is of inlaid marble, worth 300 pounds even in the 18th century. One ceiling is an extraordinarily fine copy of that in Henry VII's Chapel in Westminster Abbey.

LONDON, (AP)—The maximum yearly income of the great British lawyers is \$300,000, according to an estimate compiled by the London Evening Standard. This peak is touched at the present time by only one barrister, Sir John Simon.

Sir Douglas Hoag, before becoming attorney general, was a close second. Sir John Simon, however, is far ahead of the rest of the field so far as income is concerned. Sir Edward Clarke's best year was \$100,000. Norman Birkett, William Jowitt and Stuart Bevan are placed in the next rank of barristers.

The incomes of these celebrated barristers are said to be hardly earned. It is said that for the same effort they could have earned much more in business.

### LONDON SHIPPING SHOWS BIG INCREASE FOR YEAR

LONDON, (A.P.)—During the fiscal year just ended the London port handled more traffic than ever before, the total tonnage being 49,995,619, compared to 47,064,000 in 1925.

It is estimated that 1,000 ships of all sizes pass Gravesend every 24 hours. London's network of docks, wharves and warehouses spreads over 50 miles of river bank. Virtually 60,000 men are registered as dock workers.
