Mrs. E. F. Merritt and Mrs. Bud Choyme spent several hours in Klamath Falls Friday.

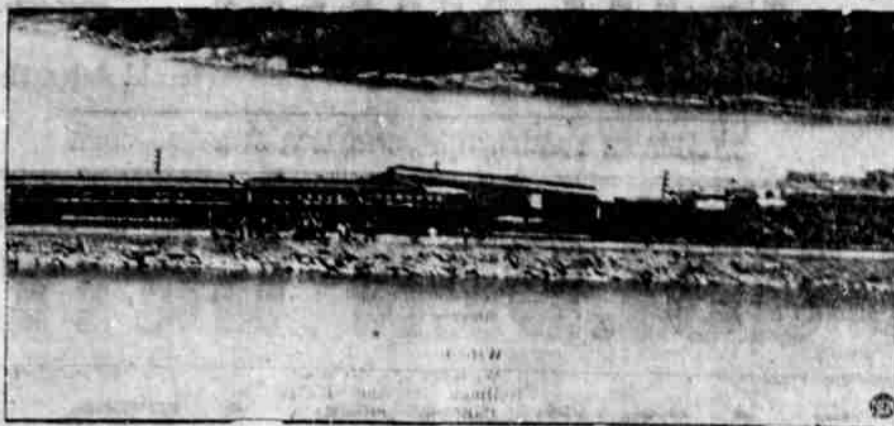
Mrs. Joe Stukel and Mrs. Fred Stukel were shopping in Klamath Falls Saturday.

FINDS CHEWERS SPREAD DISEASE IN TOBACCO

LEXINGTON, Ky., July 21. (A. P.)—Workers who chew tobacco while weeding and transplanting tobacco may spread the disease known as mosaic or dry weather freckling. Investigations by Dr. W. D. Valleau and E. M. Johnson, plant pathologists at the Kentucky agricultural experiment station, reveal.

Should the chewing tobacco be infested the disease is spread easily, the pathologists point out. The

virus has been found extremely resistant to drying, living in dry tobacco as long as 31 years.

Tests showed the disease rarely is developed in plant beds sowed and then not touched by man, whereas when handled in the ordinary manner by men chewing infested tobacco the freckling spread rapidly.

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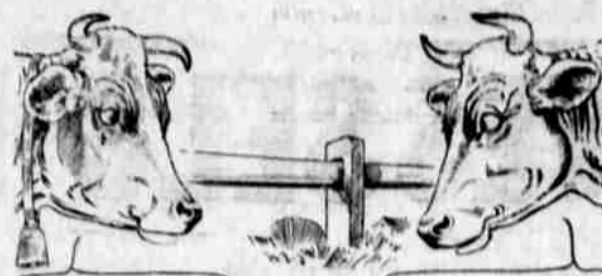
