Money in the Game

Prize fighting has become one of the greatest money games of the nation. Dempsey knocked out Sharkey last evening in the seventh round and right then and there a nucleus was formed for another million dollar fight with Tunney.

Yesterday's fight terminated in a very satisfactory manner, for Dempsey was plainly the favorite and the favorite won. Although the betting was divided there was a feeling that the old pugilist would come back. Yet, there were those who took the other view and yesterday a couple of thousand dollars was wired out to Klamath Falls from New York to be placed on Sharkey. Fortunately for the owners of the coin only a small part of it received takers.

Tex Rickard, the fight promoter, is dividing honors now with Will Hayes, the movie king. It has not been so many years ago that Tex was a shining light at Goldfield under the guidance of George Wingfield. He went east and showed them how to do this fight promoting and today he is the outstanding promoter of the world.

Sharkey went down with few real friends. The Boston sailor was rather a nasty sport character. He was cock-sure and disgusting in his manner. His unethical methods soon lost him friends among the sporting element, for after all, one has to be reasonably fair in every way to stand well among the men and women who follow the pugilistic game.

Probably the biggest money mill this country has ever witnessed will be the Tunney-Dempsey fight which will soon follow.

Settling Everything

It would seem that the Great Northern and the Southern Pacific railroads have settled about everything pertaining to the Klamath Basin situation. When they agreed on joint terminal use which means that both roads will use the same yards and depot, the last vestige of conflict was removed.

And recently the oil scouts have been showing up from Oklahoma, Texas and California. They are here because of the Loreman test well that is being drilled in the Bonanza country. The oil scouts come early and there will be more of them.

New people are plentiful these days, and here is hoping each of them may find something to his liking and make this city his home, for we have plenty of room in this big country for a lot more population.

The Useful Person

Oil Test Wells Are Showing Progress

hour shifts each, and unless production is encountered at shallow depths, the well will be carried to a depth of 4,000 feet.

About two miles south of the Oakland Petroleum corporation's well Nims & Son, formerly of Keno, are drilling a test well in section 31, township 38 south, range 11 east. A Star rig is employed and a depth of 200 feet had been attained Wednesday. This test will be carried to a depth of approximately 3500 feet, if necessary. This well was financed by Long Beach parties.

On the same structure, the Southern Oregon Oil company, of which J. E. Loreman, is president, is sinking a well with standard tools in section 19, township 39 south, range 12 east. This test had reached a depth of approximately 200 feet Wednesday. This well is located about five miles south of the Nims & Son location. This test was financed personally by J. E. Loreman, until recently, The Southern Oregon Oil company is at present offering a block of stock to complete the test.

With two wells already financed and a third in the process of raising funds to complete drilling operations, and all within a radius of six miles on the same structure, a unique situation exists, according to Mr. Dugmore, in charge of the Oakland well.

"It is seldom that three wells are drilled on the same structure until one of the wells encounters commercial production," Mr. Dugmore stated. "Those who invest in Mr. Loreman's company are offered a three to one chance for their money. It is seldom that such an opportunity is presented in proven fields. The Southern Oregon Oil company holds approximately 6,000 acres of the structure and the successful completion of any one of the wells would mean that shareholders in the company would profit greatly."

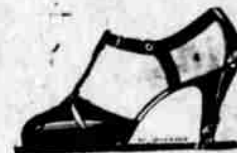
