

CAROL WANTS TO RETURN HOME AS RUMANIAN RULER

Request to Attend Funeral of Father Not Answered; Closely Guarded

PARIS, July 22. (A.P.)—Richer by his father's bequest of \$400,000, former Crown Prince Carol of Rumania now appears to cherish the idea of mounting the throne he repeatedly renounced. Judging by statements to the press, in which he refers to himself as "King Carol of Rumania."

Meanwhile his application for permission to return to Bucharest to attend the funeral of Ferdinand, has not been answered, according to his own announcement and Rumanian circles here express the belief that this or other communications he may send will receive no answers while Premier Bratianu is in power. These circles say also that the prospects of their being a King Carol II. are for the present at least, extremely remote.

Statement Given.—A statement given out in Carol's behalf, by a personage closely connected with him read:

"King Carol of Rumania, deeply afflicted by the death of his father and moved by feelings of devotion toward the late sovereign, regrets for the moment he is unable to make any communication to the press. He thus finds himself prevented from formulating a declaration which the new situation calls for. Yesterday morning he expressed telegraphically to the members of the Rumanian royal family, a desire to attend his father's funeral. Up to the present he has received no answer."

Like Prisoner.—Carol now is something like a prisoner. His villa at Neully is guarded by detectives and besieged by squads of newspapermen who observe his every movement from the streets or points of vantage of neighboring buildings. Even the shadows in the shades are being carefully noted, and all sorts of inferences drawn from them as to political conferences going on within. His servants say he is weighed

MANY FEATURES ARE STAGED AT LEGION MEETING

Department Meetings Held; Parade of "40 et 8" Arouses Interest

LA GRANDE, July 22. (A.P.)—More than 2500 visitors and delegates to the American Legion, the Legion Auxiliary and the 40 et 8 state conventions are now in La Grande, a check of the registrations indicated this morning. A total of 2,250 are listed and several hundred visitors have not registered.

Yesterday afternoon's discussions featured reports of committees. The auxiliary passed resolutions to plan for more personal contact with auxiliary units of the state and that county councils of one or more counties be organized.

Mrs. A. B. Beals, of Seattle, national vice president of the western division and Howard P. Savage, national legion commander, spoke briefly at the auxiliary meeting.

Arthur Murphy, department commander, delivered his annual report, showing that legion affairs in Oregon are in excellent shape.

The 40 et 8 parade last night more than three quarters of a mile in length, preceded the annual wreck, presided over by Charles Mills, national head of the organization.

A flying squadron of army airplanes from Spokane, Wash., is scheduled to arrive here this afternoon as a convention attraction. Other features on today's program include the drum and bugle corps contest and the coronation of the legion queen.

GUILLOTINE SMASHES BOOTLEGGERS' STILL

PITTSBURGH, July 22. (A.P.)—The idea of the guillotine has found favor in America. Not for chopping off people's heads, but for "killing" stills.

When John D. Pennington, federal prohibition administrator here, had gathered an assortment of

3000 stills, he found himself under court order to destroy them. But he was unwilling to spare his agents' time for smashing them with sledge hammers.

The trunk of a single walnut tree six feet in diameter, grown in Kentucky, recently sold for \$625.

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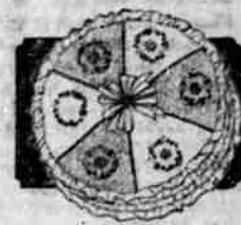
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
