SALVATION ARMY TO SEEK FUNDS FOR WORK HERE

Campaign Headquarters Opened; \$5000 is Goal Sought in Klamath

Campaign headquarters have been established in the Veterans Memorial building for the annual Home Service campaign of the Salvation Army, through courtesy of the house committee of the American Legion.

A county-wide campaign is being planned by the local advisory board to raise a fund of \$5,000 with which to "carry on" the local work of the Salvation Army for the coming 12 months.

The campaign will be known as "Klamath Falls Heart Fund" and will have for its symbol and slogan the picture of a Salvation Army lass rescuing a fallen girl with the inscription, "Open Your Heart—Invest in Your Community."

This slogan is intended to describe one of the most useful of Salvation Army endeavors—that of rescuing fallen humanity and bringing them back to self-dependency.

Civic Plan Adopted. Invitations have been sent to the leading clubs and fraternities of Klamath Falls to participate in a "kick-off" to mark the official opening of the campaign on Tuesday, August 2.

It is planned by the advisory board to assemble representatives, en-masse, from all civic organizations on this date, thereby furnishing a representative and enthusiastic working force for the campaign.

According to the campaign committee, it is planned to secure a host of workers this year so that those who volunteer their services will not be called upon for a long period of service. With this in mind, the committee feels that helpers will more readily join as helpers.

Director Arrives. Mr. and Mrs. Norman A. Borgen, financial directors of the Salvation Army for Oregon, have arrived in Klamath Falls to stay one month to assist the local advisory board in direction of the campaign. Mr. and Mrs. Borgen will be in charge of campaign headquarters in the Veterans building, and will work in conjunction with the local forces in direction and preparation for the "Heart Fund."

Organization Started. Organization is now in full progress through the county. Speakers will commence Monday presenting the year's work and Salvation Army beneficiaries before civic clubs and organizations.

Dr. G. A. Massey is chairman of the Klamath County advisory board. Other members are: Rev. Henry Thomas, secretary; Leslie Roberts, treasurer; William Lodge, Charles I. Roberts, Andrew M. Collier, E. H. Halstetter.
