



STILL ARGUING OVER BIG FIGHT

NEW YORK, July 23. (AP)—Jack Dempsey and Jack Sharkey today were far from the scene of their memorable battle of Thursday night, either at home or on the way there, but a self-appointed jury of countless fans still was locked in hopeless disagreement over the question of whether the blow that gave Dempsey a knockout victory was fair or foul.

Carefully avoiding Pennsylvania, where he is wanted on a charge of elbowing a woman spectator at the Dempsey-Tunney fight last fall, Dempsey was homeward bound for Los Angeles and a brief rest after the victory he believes he fairly won. He visited his wife's relatives at Wilmington, Del., then resumed his trip.

Sharkey, back home in Boston after motoring from here with his wife, was positive he would have won but for a blow he declares was below the belt just before he went down for the count in the seventh round of the Yankee stadium fray.

AMEE RETURNS TO HER TEMPLE

LOS ANGELES, July 23. (AP.)—Aimee Semple McPherson, evangelist, returned to Angelus Temple today, announcing that she "had come back to take the helm" and emphasizing it by naming Rev. C. E. Joyce, business manager in place of her mother, Mrs. Minnie Kennedy, who, the evangelist said, was to "retire her vacation."

The action confirmed the declaration of temple insurrectionists who had rallied against the control of Mrs. Kennedy that the latter would be ousted from any official connection with the church.

The Rev. Joyce, pastor of the Riverside branch of the church, had been personal representative of Mrs. McPherson in the controversy and lead the faction opposing Mrs. Kennedy. His succession to her office was, as the insurrectionists had declared necessary "to save the church from going on the rocks."

In announcing her mother's ouster, the evangelist said: "Like the captain of a ship, or the president of the United States, I am pastor and president of Angelus Temple and as such am entitled to control over my congregation. I have come back to take the helm."

She explained her act further by saying that her mother was "going to get her vacation. She long has needed it."

The evangelist did not deny that she had written Rev. Joyce instructing him to take charge of the services and money collections. "Mother is my mother and even if these things were true, I could not say anything about them," in declining to be quoted regarding any differences with Mrs. Kennedy.

SALVATION ARMY WORK IS SHOWN

A total of 923 families have been visited by the officers of the Klamath Falls Salvation Army corps in the past 12 months, in behalf of the sick, the lonely and the poor. It is recorded on statistics compiled at the offices of the local headquarters. Investigation of needs of unfortunates as well as conditions of sanitation and nutrition, nursing the sick and caring for children are items included in the record of the workers' visitations.

The report shows that 587 hours have been spent in visitation from door to door in the less prosperous districts.

The complete report follows:

Social Department

887 hours spent in visitations; 225 families visited; 197 families given groceries, clothing and aid; 349 given meals; 187 given lodging; 1,435 given free garments; 181 given free shoes; 7 young women sent to Rescue Home; 321 interviewed and advised; 30 women found employment; 14 men found employment; 75 Christmas dinners given; 125 children given toys at Christmas; 10 homeless children placed in homes; 3,385 aggregate afforded temporary relief.

Industrial Department

256 open air meetings conducted; 18,262 aggregate attendance; 39 indoor meetings conducted; 5,675 aggregate attendance; 8 soldiers (unpaid workers) enrolled in the Army to help increase the scope of the good work in Klamath county for 1927-28; 44 persons converted to a better life and a greater realization of citizenship; 19 junior members enrolled.

As shown by the report seven girl mothers and their babies were

cared for through the Salvation Army home in Portland from Klamath county. This particular service, in order to thoroughly bring about a complete restoration has cost a total of \$1,050 as each case averages \$150 in cost.

Statistics show that 86 per cent of these cases are permanently restored to society.

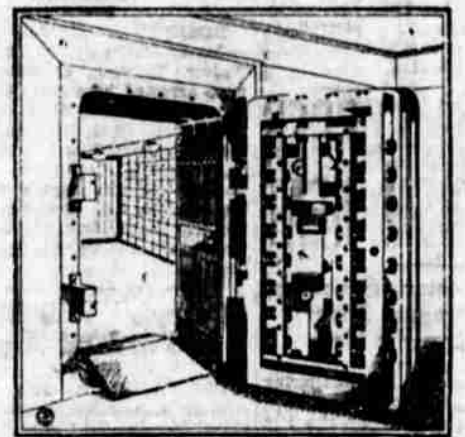
