FRANCE STILL COLLECTS FROM WAR PROFITEERS

PARIS, July 22. (A.P.)—"War profits" are still furnishing France with a steady income, nearly nine years after the war.

Nearly 2,000,000 francs a day pour into the coffers of Premier and Minister of Finance Raymond Poincare. This is money the government is recovering from contractors who "salted" their bills for munitions, as the French say, and also the taxes the various get-rich-quick merchants failed to pay.

Ever since the armistice parliamentary commissions, courts and special tribunals and accountants have been going over every war contract and the books of map business firms.

NEW LONDON STREET TO COST \$20,000,000

LONDON, (A.P.)—A stretch of road through the heart of London to the dock district is to be built at a cost of \$20,000,000.

The new road will be known as the Victoria Dockroad. It will be carried for a considerable distance on arches, thus doing away with traffic delay now caused by swing bridges and grade crossings.

Nearly 700 houses must be torn down to make way for the road. The government will pay 75 per cent of the cost, and the London county council 25 per cent.

BUCHAREST, Rumania, July 22. (A.P.)—Prince Carol remains in exile and he cannot return either to his father's funeral or later, government officials declared today.

The crown worn by King George on state occasions has two officially appointed guardians. When it is housed in the tower of London with the other crown jewels, the lieutenant of the tower is responsible for its safety, but whenever it is removed the king's bargemaster must attend and guard it.
