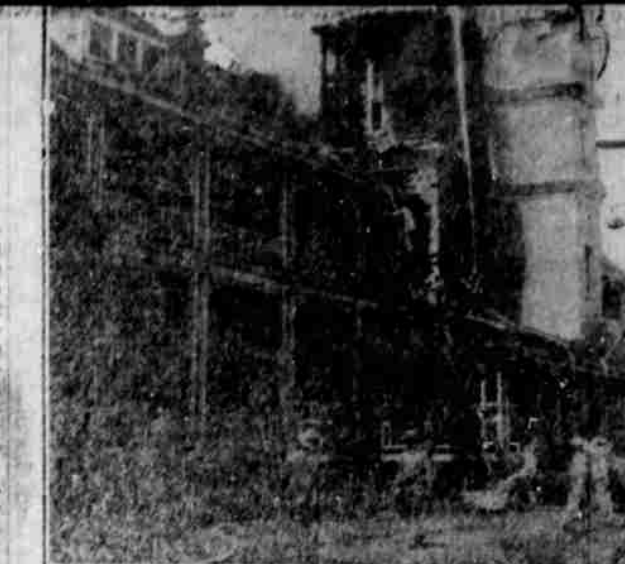

spending the week-end at the home of former Senator James D. Phelan, at Saratoga, Calif., said Crumpacker was to have been a member of the same party, but failed to rejoin the group after separating from them Friday.  
Longworth declared the congressman's home life was ideal, and was unable to offer any reason for the breakdown.  
Crumpacker had been in public life in Oregon since 1921, when he served as special deputy district attorney for Multnomah county. He was serving his second term in congress.  
He is survived by his widow and three sons.
