Bacteria are Magified to Unusual Size

ROCHESTER, N. Y., July 27. (AP)—The motion picture camera and the microscope got together here today to disclose to man the performance of a troupe of bacteria whose stage might have been the head of a pin. The plot dealt with the growth of disease germs and other microscopic organisms, but man put speed to nature's process, showing on the screen in three minutes, a development of life forms that actually requires 44 hours.

The motion pictures were produced by an apparatus perfected by Dr. Stanhope Hayne-Jones of the department of bacteriology of the University of Rochester's school of medicine, and Clifford M. Tuttle of the Eastman Kodak company's research laboratory, and announced today after three years of experimentation.

The inventors declared that the apparatus, which is a combination of a stock motion picture camera and a stock microscope, provides for the first time a means of teaching bacteriology and conducting scientific research without prohibitive expense or great difficulty, and gives a continuous record of every phase of development of bacteriological specimens at a minimum expenditure of time by research workers.

In the demonstration today, pictures were shown of germs which were only 1-25,000 of an inch wide and 3-25,000 of an inch long, magnified on the screen to two thousand times their natural size, they were, in appearance, not unlike animated sausages which unfolded as they grew and multiplied.

Another film showed the development of the rotifer, an organism too small to be seen with the naked eye, which infests stagnant water.

Klamath Farming Report Now Ready

A compiled report of the Klamath County Agricultural Economic Conference, which was held in this city in early February, has been completed and delivered to the chamber of commerce. Over 3000 copies of the report which covers 62 pages in book form, were ordered by the local chamber through the Oregon Ag-

ricultural college extension service.

A copy of the book, which contains endless data on farming in this county, will be sent to every farmer in the county. A portion of the books will be left at the Tourists Bureau on the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway to be distributed to interested tourists.

The bulletin was published in order to have on record the findings and recommendations of the various groups that make up the Klamath County Agricultural Economic Conference.

For several weeks previous to the conference, a careful and detailed study of the county's agriculture was made by various committees of local business men and farmers, assisted by specialists of the extension service of Oregon State Agricultural college.

Crops and livestock production, actual and potential, transportation facilities, distribution costs, and many other problems confronting the farmers are reviewed by these committees.

FRESH EGG AGE LIMIT

LONDON. (AP)—When is an egg bad?

That is what a committee appointed by the Ministry of Agriculture is trying to ascertain. The committee has had sittings with the National Farmers' Union and the National Poultry Council on the application for an order making the marking of imported eggs compulsory.

Many poultry dealers said they agreed that the age limit for a fresh egg was 14 days. A Leith importer, however, said that he had frequently eaten Russian eggs, cooked in various ways, which were six weeks old, but were quite fresh.

Then said the chairman of the committee:

"I don't suppose you'd say you eat them from preference, but rather by way of experience."

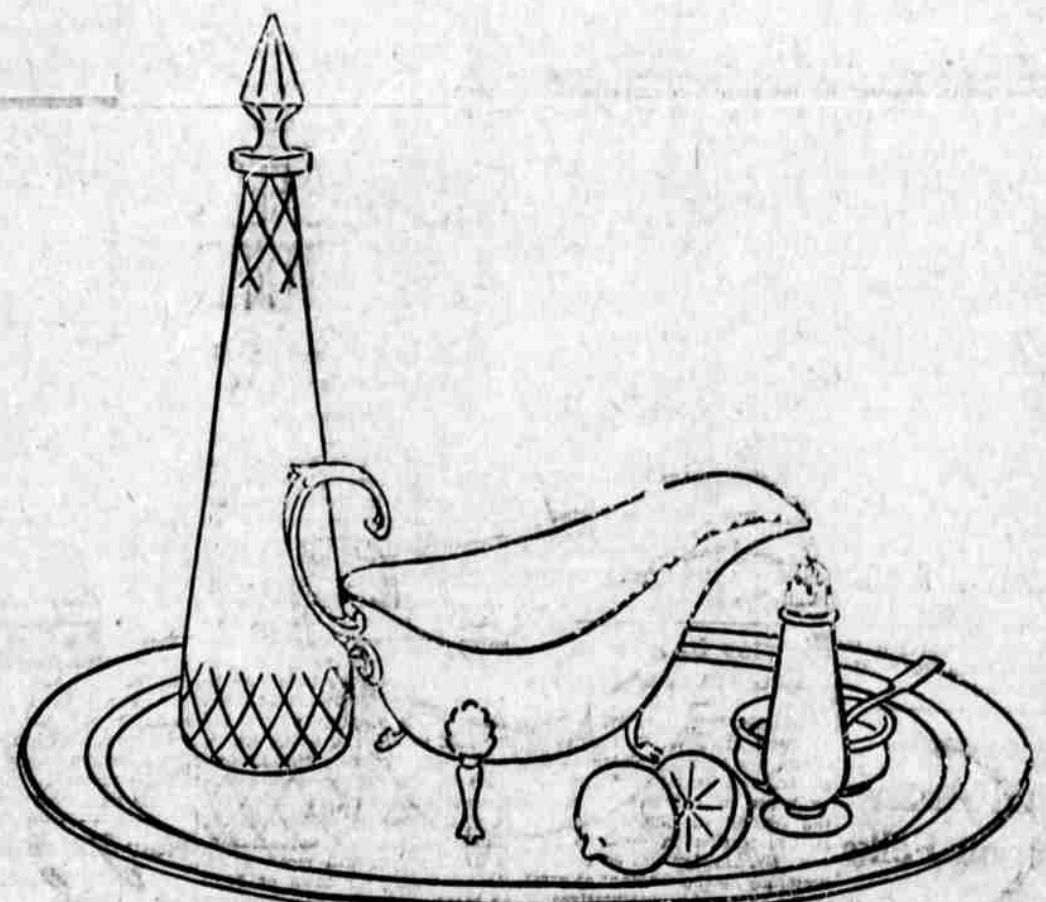
