Southern Pacific Lowers Log Rates

Announcement was made today by Mr. J. T. Saunders, freight traffic manager of the Southern Pacific Co. that effective August 15th log rates on the O. C. & E. would be as follows: Swan Lake to Klamath Falls, \$11 per 40-foot car; Dairy to Klamath Falls, \$11 per 40-foot car; Squaw Valley to Klamath Falls, \$12 per 40-foot car; Sprague River to Klamath Falls, \$12.50 per 40-foot car. Switching charges at Klamath Falls when to Southern Pacific industries also will be eliminated.

This is a material reduction in log rates and was received with much elation by local lumber concerns today.

DELEGATES GO TO CONFERENCE

LONDON, July 27. (AP)—W. C. Bridgman of the British admiralty, and Viscount Cecil left for Geneva this morning to participate in a resumption of the naval conference there. They had been in London a week, having come from Geneva to place before the cabinet a report on the status of the naval parleys and to receive further instructions for the re-conference.

Before entraining Mr. Bridgman said: "We shall finish our work this time, one way or the other. We are going back after long discussions with the cabinet and I think the position is clear. The government thoroughly discussed the whole situation and the position of Great Britain remains fundamentally unchanged. I can only say I have just as good hope for a settlement as when we came back."

Lord Cecil remarked: "I am always hopeful, but I regard the position as unquestionably critical." The delegates are due in Geneva Thursday morning.

Leaves Widow Nothing. WASHINGTON, (AP)—Says the will of Henry White, former diplomat regarding Mrs. White: "There is nothing that I could leave her that would adequately compensate her for my love and affection for her." The will, disposing of more than \$1,000,000, leaves the widow nothing. Provision was made for her during her husband's life time.

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Will Sell Mill at Sheriff's Auction

Announcement was made last night by Sheriff Hawkins that the holdings of the Wheeler-Olmstead company in Klamath county will be sold at public auction from the court house steps Saturday morning. This action follows the dissolution of an injunction in federal court earlier this week, in which Lloyd Wentworth sought to halt the sale on charges that F. H. Hunter of this city had purchased much of the concern's holdings in order to gain control of the property at low cost.

The federal court held that Mr. Hunter was in every way responsible and was within his rights in purchasing holdings of the defunct company.
