or another been called on to choose between two paths, one leading to immediate victory in politics or business through means which he ought—and knows he ought—to scorn to use, and the other to possible defeat through his unwillingness to employ such means, says the Indianapolis News. The choice is often difficult—so weak is human nature. It is natural for men to desire to win, and we fear it is natural for most men to resort to sharp practice in their struggle for victory. The latter is a human weakness, though the former is not.

Success in any honorable undertaking is not a crime, and there certainly is nothing wrong in it. But success may be, as it often is, bought at too high a price. A sullied and tarnished victory ought to be thought of as disgraceful—as it is. It is disgraceful whether or not it brings with it its penalty, which it sometimes does not do. Whether Henry Clay was in earnest when he said, "I would rather be right than be president," that surely is the way he should have felt—the way all other men should feel.

There is a glory in failure, in the willingness to fail, which in these days of the glorification of success is, we fear, slightly appreciated. Macbeth, to whom justice has perhaps not been done, had the root of the matter in him. Of him his wife said:

—thou would'st be great;
Art not without ambition, but without
The illness should attend it; what thou would'st
highly,

Thou would'st holily; would'st not play false,
And yet would'st wrongly win.

He chose the path to success by abhorrent means—in his case murder—and he lost; lost honor, love, obedience, troops of friends, and found life to be only—a tale

Told by an idiot, full of sound and fury,
Signifying nothing.

It is a terrible picture of the life of every man who wins by foul means, who puts victory as his object above everything else. Human life is largely an affair of these two paths. Either may lead to success, in the one case base and in the other honorable, or one may lead to base success and the other to noble failure. The latter is the choice almost every day offered to every man. Success won by foul means almost invariably exacts its price. But whether it does or not, it is itself a foul thing, known to be so in the inmost heart of him who wins it.

Ford's Magazine Changes Policy

DETROIT, Mich., July 28. (AP)—In apparent sympathy with earlier announcements that the Dearborn Independent, heretofore considered the official mouthpiece of Henry Ford, would be turned into a house organ, not for general concern, Henry Ford has ordered dealers to discontinue subscriptions to the publication.

The order was contained in a letter received by most dealers Tuesday. Return of subscriptions already made to the subscribers also was ordered. The agencies have been required to obtain subscriptions for the Independent as well as sell cars and tractors. Official confirmation of any intention to restrict the Independent to the Ford organization was lacking at the business offices of the publication and elsewhere.

WASHINGTON, July 28.—The servants of the people, functioning in Washington and elsewhere as parts of the federal government, assume far more dignity than the ordinary servant, and it is very hard to find any humility among them.

Their success in persuading the multitude to take them seriously, as no doubt they should be taken, is probably responsible for the failure of the ordinary citizen to attach to them the sort of nicknames with which he tags others prominent in the public eye.

Certainly the hard-working officials down here are entitled to at least as much affection as the lady murderers of Chicago, among whom there has been a long procession of "wolf women," "tiger women," "hyena women" and so on. New York has never been slow to nickname its Rhinelanders and its Brownings and the spirit of the entire country was demonstrated when it made Lindbergh its own "Lindy."
