CHAMBERLIN TELLS PLANS

LONDON, July 27. (AP)—Sir
Austin Chamberlin, the foreign
secretary, in a statement in Com-
mons regarding the naval con-
ference at Geneva today said
that in the opinion of the gov-
ernment there need be no diffi-
culty in arriving at temporary
arrangement regarding the im-
mediate future of cruiser build-
ing.

Sir Austin added, however,
that the British empire could
not be asked to give any such
temporary arrangement the ap-
pearance of an immutable prin-
ciple which might be treated as
precedent.

Sir Austin said that it would
be improper at this stage to make
any detailed explanation of the
British proposals or those of the
other interested powers.

"The statement I am going to
read is therefore designed only
to remove a misunderstanding
which, if continued uncorrected,
could not but impede the pros-
pects of success," he said.

"Despite the efforts of dele-
gates at Geneva, serious mis-
apprehensions of the aims of
the British government still pre-
vail in some quarters," contin-
ued the foreign secretary. "His
majesty's government even has
been charged with the desire to
destroy that equality of sea power
as between the United States
and the British empire, which
the Washington conference, con-
templated—a suspicion for which
there is no foundation."

The invitation of the president
of the United States to take
part in the disarmament con-
ference was understood by his
majesty's government to be based
on the desire to develop the
policy of the Washington con-
ference by diminishing yet further
labor and expenditure while
maintaining national security.

"With this two-fold aim his
majesty's government is in com-
plete agreement and they desire
to measure the merits of every
proposal by the degree to which
it furthers this two-fold pur-
pose."

Many Killed When Reservoir Breaks

LONDON, July 27. (AP)—An
unconfirmed report from Abin-
dabad, Bombay presidency, Brit-
ish India, states that 1,000
deaths occurred in the native
state of Baroda as the result of
a reservoir fifteen square miles
in area bursting its banks and
flooding surrounding villages.
Communications between Bombay
and Baroda are cut off.

ROYAL EXCHANGE NOW FALLING INTO DISUSE

LONDON, (AP)—The Royal
Exchange, at one time the great-
est business center of the Brit-
ish capital, is slowly falling into
disuse. It is a large building
with a square court in the cen-
ter, situated between the Bank
of England and Mansion House.
As far back as 1842 this build-
ing was valued at 150,000
pounds. To build it now would
cost a far greater sum. Once
each pillar in the large hall was
allotted to one of the ancient
city companies. Members of the
various guilds used to gather
round their particular pillars for
the transaction of business.

The war removed these busi-
ness operations. With one excep-
tion, all the big trades today
have their own special exchanges.
Every Wednesday, however, mem-
bers of the old company of wax
candlers and chemical makers
still meet to transact business.
This is now the sole commercial
use of this one-time hub of busi-
ness activity.

MEMORIAL RAISED TO GENERAL BOOTH

LONDON, (AP)—A world mem-
orial is being built here to the
late General William Booth,
founder of the Salvation Army.
It is a college for Salvation
Army officers, costing \$1,500,-
000.

The most prominent feature of
the building will be the great
central tower, 200 feet high, sur-
mounted by a powerful electric
light, which will be visible
throughout South London. The
college will be finished in 1929,
the centenary year of the birth
of General Booth.

WOMEN ALLOWED TO JOIN POLITICAL CLUBS

LONDON, July 27. (AP)—Wom-
en are not to be excluded from
political clubs.
When a discussion whether
they should be barred was at
its height, owing to decision of
the Larkhall Liberal club of Bath
not to have women members, the
National Liberal club here set
aside a special visitors' room and
announced that women would be
admitted for lunch, tea or din-
ner provided they are accom-
panied by members.

Some of the Larkhall club
members said that if women were

admitted, "they would upset
everything."
Philip Snowden, socialist mem-
ber of parliament, said: "I think
it is a perfect silly thing to at-
tempt to exclude women from
the club."

MUSEUMS IN ENGLAND HAVE MANY USES

LONDON, July 27. (AP)—One
who goes to a museum in Eng-
land is not necessarily a seeker
after truth. The royal commis-
sion of museums and galleries
says there are these others:
Shorthand students use the
free lectures as a means of taking
dictation.

Foreign students regard the
lectures as opportunities for
learning English.

Boys like the polished ban-
diers to slide down.

Many people appoint the mu-
seum as their meeting place.

And, as A. O. Curie, director
of the royal Scottish museum,
says, museums are even used for
filiations.

Hence, the 6,000,000 people
who yearly visit London's mu-
seums will be called upon here-
after to pay an entrance fee of
two cents.

FALCONRY NEAR END AS ENGLISH SPORT

LONDON, July 27. (AP)—Fal-
conry, that old and honorable
sport, which in the middle ages
disputed for first place with
hunting and jousting, is fast dis-
appearing.

The Old Hawking club, the
last to keep alive the ancient
sport, has just gone out of ex-
istence. Falconry is still prac-
ticed by some persons in private.
They obtain their falcons, how-
ever, in Holland. Occasionally
a rider is to be seen following
the flight of the falcon on horse-
back.

NEW YORK, (AP)—The will
of Mrs. Jordan L. Mott, is inter-
preted as showing that her son
has been forgiven for his elope-
ment 15 years ago with Mrs.
Frances Hewitt Bowne, an ac-
tress. He is bequeathed \$25,000.

Mrs. Mott's husband, wealthy

his name.
