OIL COMPANY USES RADIO COMMUNICATION
 BRECKENRIDGE, Tex., July 27. (AP)—Big business has turned to a radio as a means of cheap and reliable communication in the oil area of the broad plains of Texas where other means sometimes are cramped.
 The Phillips Petroleum company is installing a 1,000 watt radio station to be used in transmitting reports to and receiving orders from company headquarters at Bartlesville, Okla., and for communication between this and other districts of the company.
 The station will be one of three operated by the Phillips company, the others being at Borger, also in the Texas oil fields, and at the home office in Bartlesville.

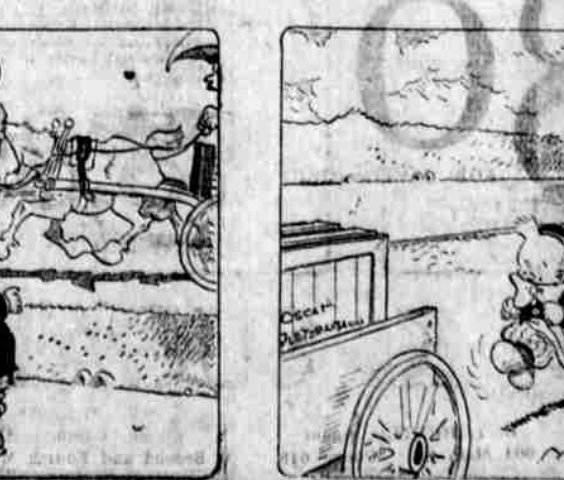
