

BIG DRIVE TO START MONDAY

Salvation Army Work En- dorsed by President of Local Chamber

The Salvation Army \$5,000 Heart Fund campaign is moving forward with big strides. It was announced from campaign headquarters in the Veterans' Memorial building. Several of the city's civic organizations have announced their committees to campaign headquarters, and many are working to get their captains and workers confirmed before Monday.

"A full roster of workers will be available on Monday," according to Norman A. Borgen, campaign director. "Those who have reported to date, have shown a full quota of workers," he said. The goal is \$5,000.

Fund is Endorsed
Incidental with the opening of the campaign, a letter of endorsement has been received from C. H. Underwood, president of Klamath Falls Chamber of Commerce.

Farm Hints

Nearly all diseases or disorders of calves are caused by lack of cleanliness. Rickets in which the calves are fed and also the pens in which they are kept always should be scrupulously clean.

Prevention of meat spoilage really begins before slaughter. Holding the live animals in pens overnight, with plenty of clean water but no food, usually will diminish the number of destructive organisms in the flesh.

The proper length of time that a cow should be dry depends on

the quantity of milk she has produced and on her condition of flesh. Cows of low or medium production should be dry a month or six weeks. High producers require a longer dry period.

Chestnut killed by blight is being replaced naturally by oak to a large extent. The chestnut trees are doomed, and stands running heavily to chestnut should be almost clear cut to accelerate growth of other species. Seed trees of other valuable types should be left to restock the areas.

In a locality where there is a market for wood for hand stocks, ash, beech, birch, hickory, sugar, maple and white oak are the best trees to conserve or replant in the farm woodlands.

Some kind of meat food for hens is desirable for maximum egg production and also to keep the birds in good condition. Most of the staple grains do not fully supply the protein requirements

of the hen. For this reason meat scraps generally are used in the dry or wet mash rations. Milk in some form, while not entirely taking the place of meat, provides part of the necessary protein and is a good supplement to the regular diet.
